Choose Programs from the upper left hand corner. Choose Abuse Hotline from the index along the left hand side of the screen. Then select Reports and Publications near the bottom of the page. Go to the Child Abuse Annual Statistical Tables report for the fiscal year needed, then find the table titled Children Identified as Victims. Use the Unduplicated Count, under Abuse, Neglect or Threatened Harm, Subtotal – Some Indication and Verified, then divide by the Child Population Age Birth-17 (in the same table) and multiply by 1,000 to get the rate per 1,000 children.</p> <p>Note: The Department of Children and Families uses the unduplicated count for their reporting. Consequently, at the 3/10/06 meeting, the Florida Interprogram Task Force decided to use the unduplicated counts at well. Go to the Child Abuse Annual Statistical Tables report for the fiscal year needed, then find the table titled Recurrence of Maltreatment after Initial Report of Maltreatment. Total columns under If recurrence, remaltreatment occurred within: (use 1-2 months, 2-4 months, and 5-6 months). Then, divide total by # Victims with Verified/Indicated Abuse, Neglect or Threatened Harm and multiply by 100 to get the percentage.</p> <p>Note: The Department of Children and Families began using the Federal Fiscal Year to collect these data in the second part of 2003. In The Plan, we reported 8.8 as the 2003 re-abuse rate, however, when recalculated using the second half of the year for the re-abuse time period, the re-abuse rate was 9.2.
