II. PROCESS USED TO DEVELOP THE PLAN AND THE PLAN UPDATE

Planning Effort Lead:

Description of Circuit 14:

Circuit Fourteen is comprised of six counties in Northwest Florida: Bay, Calhoun, Gulf, Holmes, Jackson and Washington. Big Bend Community Based Care is the contracted service provider for the Department of Children and Families in Circuit 14. Big Bend Community Based Care subcontracts with Life Management Center, Anchorage Children's Home, Children's Home Society, DISC Village, and Camelot Community Care for the provision of in home, out of home, independent living, and adoptive services within the circuit.

Bay County has several military installations, including Tyndall Air Force Base and the Naval Coastal Systems Station. In all but Bay County, government is the largest employer throughout the Circuit.

Per the U. S. Census Bureau Circuit 14 encompasses 4412 square miles. Five of the six counties are considered to be rural, resulting in transportation being a concern for the residents of Circuit 14.

All six counties' average annual wage, based on 2008 data, is below the statewide average. Bay is the only county in Circuit 14 that does not exceed the statewide average of 13.3% of the general population living below the Poverty Level, per 2008 data. Only Bay County in Circuit 14 exceeds the statewide percent of persons aged 25 and older whose education is high school graduate or higher. None of our six counties exceeds the statewide average in percent of persons aged 25 and older with a bachelor's degree or higher.

All six counties exceed the statewide average of 218.3 for admission to prison per 100,000 persons (FY 2007-08). Circuit 14 exceeds the statewide average for percent of females that represent new commitments to prison. Circuit 14 exceeds the statewide average for juvenile delinquency complaints (ages 10-17) filed per 100,000 juveniles. At 209.6, Circuit 14 exceeds the statewide average of 124.9 of number of registered sex offenders and predators per 100,000 persons.

Description of planning team.

See Attachment 1 for members' name and agency affiliation. The planning team was comprised of community partners throughout Circuit 14. Members are affiliated with governmental, private and faith-based organizations.

Overview of meetings held. Members of the planning team commence the planning process through attendance at the Statewide Meeting in Altamonte Springs, Florida in May 2009. Follow up occurred through attendance at the CAPP Meeting held prior to the Dependency Summit. Various meetings were held within Circuit 14 including a training session provided by the Office of Family Safety. Breakout groups met to work on various portions of the plan,

including, Prevention, Faith Based Initiative, Adoption Support, Adoption Promotion, Early Education, and service provision within the Circuit. The breakout groups met independently of the local planning team convener.


Overview of plan development process.

The plan development process was initiated with a small group of service providers throughout the Circuit. Additional community partners joined in the effort providing guidance and expertise in their various fields. A small group of team members met with the Prevention Manager of the Office of Family Safety. Group members convened meetings with their partners to develop their assigned sections of the plan. A follow up meeting was held with all parties where the overall plan was presented to provide the entire group the opportunity to provide comments and for necessary changes to be made in the plan. Smaller groups again convened to complete their assigned sections.



I. STATUS OF CHILD MALTREATMENT



Bay County is the largest populated county in Circuit 14. The Circuit is predominately white in all six counties. However, Bay and Jackson counties have significantly more black populous than the other four counties.



Circuit 14's Maltreatment Rate in 2008 – 2009 remained higher than the statewide average in five of the six counties. The maltreatment rate decreased in all counties, some significant decreases and some slight decreases, while the statewide average remained close to the same as the previous year.

Bay County rate is equal to 488 victims.

Calhoun County rate is equal to 22 victims.


Gulf County rate is equal to 39 victims.

Holmes County rate is equal to 71 victims.


Jackson County rate is equal to 98 victims.

Statewide rate is equal to 38,757 victims.




The child population in 2009 remained close to the same in all counties as it had the previous year. Bay and Jackson Counties continue to hold the highest population of all six counties.




In 2009, the Child Protective Investigation units in Circuit 14 focused on efforts to streamline findings of maltreatments to ensure consistency across the Circuit. The Northwest Region Family Safety Program Office provided data on comparison with findings statewide, by Circuit's within the Region, and by units within the Circuit. Over the past year, Circuit 14 child investigators significantly changed their focus on providing accurate findings and became more in line with the statewide percent of findings.

Circuit 14 : Unduplicated Victims with Verified as most Serious Finding by Age Received 6-1-08 - 5-31-09



June 2008 - May 2009**




Bay County is the most populated county in Circuit 14 and is the "richest" county for available resources. Most other counties utilize services either located in or out posted from Bay County. We currently employ 33 Child Protective Investigators to serve Bay County families. Locally, we have joined efforts with the Bay County Sheriff's Office to address the significant number of Substance Misuse maltreatments in an effort to enhance our knowledge and investigative skills on these cases.




Calhoun County is the second smallest county based on population in Circuit 14 and with severely limited resources for our families. Calhoun county families are served by the Jackson County Child Protective Investigations units. As with all of the counties in Circuit 14, Substance Misuse is the top maltreatment in Calhoun County.

June 2008- May 2009




Gulf County is the smallest county based on population in Circuit 14 and with severely limited resources for our families. One Child Protective Investigator serves Gulf County families. As with all of the counties in Circuit 14, Substance Misuse is the top maltreatment in Gulf County.

Holmes County: Alleged Matreatment Counts June 2008 - May 2009




Holmes County is a small, rural county in Circuit 14 with limited resources for our families. Six Child Protective Investigators serve Holmes and Washington County families jointly. As with all of the counties in Circuit 14, Substance Misuse is the top maltreatment in Holmes County.

June 2008 - May 2009**




Jackson County is the second highest populated county in Circuit 14 and is the second "richest" for available resources. Three of the other counties (Calhoun, Holmes, Washington) utilize services either located in or out posted from Jackson County. Seven Child Protective Investigators cover Jackson County. . As with all of the counties in Circuit 14, Substance Misuse is the top maltreatment in Jackson County.

June 2008 - May 2009**




Washington County is a small, rural county in Circuit 14 with limited resources for our families. Six Child Protective Investigators serve Holmes and Washington County families jointly. As with all of the counties in Circuit 14, Substance Misuse is the top maltreatment in Washington County.

June 2008 - May 2009**




Substance Misuse is overwhelmingly the most alleged maltreatment in Circuit 14. Threatened Harm, Family Violence Threatens Child, Inadequate Supervision, and Environmental Hazards were the maltreatments rounding out the top of five for each of the counties in the Circuit. Efforts to educate investigators to better assess and combat the maltreatments have been initiated. Circuit 14 has recently completed a review of all investigations alleging substance misuse over a sixth (6th) month time period to determine what drug(s) are most prevalent to ensure adequate training on how to properly handle the specific substance cases, what investigators are doing to ensure a thorough investigation is conducted on substance misuse investigations, actions to engage services when needed, and actions to ensure an informed decision is made when staffed with Children's Legal Services. Preliminary results have indicated a need for enhanced training in the area of prescription medication use and abuse as this substance is the most alleged misused of all illegal and legal substances. Discussions with local law enforcement support the preliminary finding and trainings between child investigators and law enforcement are forthcoming. Also, Circuit 14 has researched and leadership has begun working on efforts to enhance child investigators understanding and assessment of the dynamics of domestic violence and family violence threatens child maltreatment. Within the year, each unit in Circuit 14 will have trained Subject Matter Experts on domestic violence. Children's Legal Services and case management are also being offered the opportunity to engage in this expertise. Since Substance Misuse and Family Violence Threatens Child are also the mostly commonly verified maltreatments leadership is supportive of investing in education and training to ensure child investigators are better equipped at assessing these two maltreatment types and ensuring needed services are identified, referred, and engaged in a timely manner.

Circuit 14 - Unduplicated Count of Victims with Verified as the Most Serious Finding by Age Received June 1, 2008, through May 31, 2009




The most vulnerable population in child welfare are children aged five (5) and younger. This is due to limited visibility, dependency on caregiver to provide for all needs, and limited verbal abilities. In Circuit 14, children zero (0) to five (5) years of age were the most maltreated in the timeframe noted. This group accounted for almost half at 49% of victims with Verified maltreatments as the most serious finding.


Circuit 14 - Demographic Detail of Alleged Victims for Reports Received During Fiscal Year 2008-2009



Circuit 14 - Demographics of Alleged Perpetrators Received by Intake County During Fiscal Year 2008-2009




The majority of alleged victims and alleged perpetrators in Circuit 14 are of the white race. Gender does not play a significant role in either of the alleged, however alleged perpetrators of maltreatment are slightly more likely to be female. Alleged perpetrators are over 50% likely to be in the twenty-six (26) years old and over range, while alleged victims are either zero (0) to four (4) or nine (9) to seventeen (17) years old. As noted in the previous chart, those alleged victims zero (0) to four (4) are our most vulnerable and most maltreated victims.



Child Counseling Services, Substance Abuse Services, and Case Management Services are the top three (3) recommended services at closure of child protective investigations in Circuit 14. Day Care Services comes in fourth (4th). Child Counseling Services are referred the vast majority of the time by investigators. These services, when referred for children, are typically those performed by Florida Therapy Services, Inc. and Life Management Center, Inc. to address psychiatric, psychosocial, therapeutic behavioral, individual, group, family therapy, sexual, or any other need identified by investigations or once counseling has begun. However, the Florida Safe Families Network (FSFN) system does not differentiate between child or adult in this section. It simply states "Counseling Services". The printout ties the word "child" to it. When counseling referrals are made for parents or caregivers they are also captured in this section. Substance Abuse Services are understandably second as most referred due to the high alleged and verified maltreatment rate in the Circuit. It is imperative for leadership in Circuit 14 to ensure investigators have an understanding of the types of recommended services listed in the statewide database, Florida Safe Families Network (FSFN), and are reporting accurately.

Circuit 14 - Children in Out-Home-Care Greater Than 12 Months on June 30, 2009



Northwest Region Family Safety Program Office reported on January 09, 2010 a continued decrease in children in out of home care greater than twelve (12) months from July 2008 to December 2009. This decrease is in large part is due to the efforts of Children's Legal Services, case management organizations (Anchorage Children's Home and Children's Home Society of Florida), local adoption provider (Life Management Center, Inc.), Big Bend Community Based Care, Guardian ad Litem, and the judicial system actively working to achieve permanency for the children.

II. CONTINUA OF PRIMARY AND SECONDARY PREVENTION PROGRAMS

A continuum of programs necessary for a comprehensive approach to prevention of all types of child abuse, abandonment, and neglect (including brief descriptions of such programs and services) §39.001(8)(b)6.f

It is the intent of this planning effort to prevent child abuse, abandonment, and neglect before it ever occurs. Thus, for the purpose of this prevention plan, the continuum of programs (necessary for a comprehensive approach to prevention of all types of child abuse, abandonment, and neglect) focuses on the first two of the three levels of prevention and prevention-focused strategies:

II.A. CONTINUUM OF PRIMARY/UNIVERSAL PREVENTION PROGRAMS AND SERVICES Accessible by the general public prior to the occurrence of child abuse and neglect

Community Development – Community capacity building, community partnerships, etc.

Community Support for Families – Family resource centers, community events and fairs, etc.

Family Supportive Programs/Services – Voluntary home visiting; developmental screening; affordable, accessible quality childcare; before and after school programs; recreational activities; parent support groups; parent education classes; marriage and relationship counseling and support services; etc.

Information and Referral and Helplines – Access to information about community and social services available for families including early health and development services, etc.

Public Awareness and Education Campaigns – Highlighting risk/protective factors, child development, positive parenting, child safety, domestic violence and substance abuse prevention, bullying prevention, etc.

Workforce – Family-friendly workplace policies, livable wage policies, etc.

II.B. CONTINUUM OF SECONDARY/SELECTED PREVENTION PROGRAMS AND SERVICES Targeted to families with multiple risk factors prior to the occurrence of child Abuse and Neglect

Adult Education – High School Diploma, GED, job training, ESL classes, mentoring for high risk youth, etc.

Community Development – Community building, community partnerships, etc.

Community Support for Families – Food banks, clothing banks, housing assistance, transportation, emergency assistance, food stamps, quality childcare, etc.

Concrete Services – Referrals for (or provision of) clothing, food, utility payments, housing assistance, transportation, emergency assistance, respite care, etc.

Family Supportive Programs/Services – Voluntary home visiting (e.g., for families that meet Healthy Families Florida and Healthy Start criteria), parent education classes, teen parenting services, parent self-help support groups, domestic violence supports, substance abuse and mental health services, respite care (including families with disabilities), counseling for adults and children, developmental assessments, etc.

Workforce – Family-friendly workplace policies and livable wage policies, etc.

II.C. FLORIDA'S ECOLOGICAL FRAMEWORK


Florida's ecological framework serves to organize the potential influence and impact of prevention strategies and is based on the following assumptions:

- Children and families exist as part of an ecological system. This means that prevention strategies must target interventions at multiple levels: the individual, the relationship, the community, and society.
- Primary responsibility for the development and well-being of children lies within the family, and all segments of society must support families as they raise their children.
- Assuring the well-being of all families is the cornerstone of a healthy society and requires universal access to support programs and services.

It comprises four levels of influence:


1. **Individual level:** At this level are **parent and child characteristics** – emotional and psychological characteristics, temperament, behavior, problem-solving skills, health conditions, and beliefs – that can affect the rearing of children. Interventions at this level are often designed to affect an individual's social skills, cognitive skills, behavior and immediate circumstances.
2. **Relationship level:** **Interpersonal relationships** with peers, intimate partners, and family members shape an individual's behavior and range of experiences. This level contains factors such as family size, cohesion, communication, support, conflict, and stability that directly affect the child and influence the way in which adults care for children and each other. Interventions at this level are often designed to improve a person's ability to engage in positive and constructive relationships, especially within the immediate family.

3. **Community level:** Families operate within **neighborhoods and communities**. Factors that characterize this level include availability of supports (governmental and community), stability, violence, poverty, disorganization, and isolation; all affect the ability of families and communities to nurture their children. Interventions at the community level are typically designed to impact the climate, systems and policies in a given (usually geographic) setting.
4. **Societal level:** The **larger culture** in which families operate and children are raised plays a significant role in how families care for their young. Religious or cultural belief systems, values such as self-reliance and family privacy, and the cultural acceptance of media violence and corporal punishment of children affect the way in which parents raise their children and the ways in which communities support families. Interventions at the societal level typically involve collaborations of multiple partners to change laws and policies as well as to determine and influence societal norms and harmful cultural belief systems.

VI. PLAN OF ACTION FOR THE PREVENTION OF CHILD ABUSE, ABANDONMENT, AND NEGLECT

Vision

Florida's highest priority is that children are raised in healthy, safe, stable, and nurturing families.

Mission

To serve as a blueprint that will be implemented to provide for the care, safety, and protection of all of Florida's children in an environment that fosters healthy social, emotional, intellectual, and physical development.

Outcome

All families and communities ensure that children are safe and nurtured and live in stable environments that promote well-being.

Circuit Goal 1

Children and teenagers are free from abuse, abandonment, and neglect and have safe, loving and permanent homes as measured by a reduction in the circuit-level child abuse rate from the fiscal year 2008-09 of 15.09 to a rate of 14.09 per 1,000 children by 30 June 2015.

Bay County Goal 1.1

VII.A. MONITORING PLAN IMPLEMENTATION

To ensure the Circuit 14 planning team monitors the ongoing progress of the implementation of the plan a format needs to be determined and followed. It is important all of the planning and implementing partners be actively involved on a regular basis to discuss their efforts and determine how, collectively, they are taking action as a continuous process. This will provide opportunities to determine and celebrate the producing of measurable improvement in the well-being of the circuit's communities and in the performance of the programs contributing to these results.

Various Meetings

Various meetings occur within the Circuit on a routine basis which will involve members of the planning team. It is imperative for team members to remember the efforts of this plan and serve as educators and leaders in those meetings to garner support for the efforts and seek additional resources to ensure implementation.

Quarterly Meetings

Members who volunteered to take active leads with implementation efforts will complete their sections of the monitoring report template and notify the entire planning team of their progress on a quarterly basis. These notifications will serve to guide decisions about process implementation and performance. The information will then be rolled up into the monitoring reports to be submitted to the Executive Office of the Governor. It is expected that members of each effort will meet outside of the quarterly meetings to ensure progress is made. The meetings will be scheduled by the team lead and are to be held as needed.

Semi Annually Meetings

The entire planning team will convene semi annually to talk through the outline for the annual progress report. This will allow for sharing of information, informing team members of progress made so informed decision making about continued and future actions can be made, and enhancing the initial core members of the team with other participants who may desire to initiate other efforts which arise in the circuit.

VII.B ANNUAL PROGRESS REPORTING

Members who volunteered to take active leads with implementation efforts will complete their sections of the monitoring report template and notify the entire planning team of their progress on a quarterly basis. This information will then be rolled up into the monitoring reports to be submitted to the Executive Office of the Governor. Any additional information obtained during various, quarterly, or semi annual meetings can also be provided and added to the reports, as needed.

VIII. BARRIERS

It is important for this plan to serve as a Circuit 14 community plan and be acknowledged and respected as such. The efforts identified, strategies put in place to achieve the efforts, and needs identified are those of the individuals with a vested interest in the local community. Members of the planning team and those taking active leads know the needs of Circuit 14 and their continued involvement and ideas to achieve the efforts must be supported by leadership outside of Circuit 14.

As with most plans and/or projects momentum comes and goes at periodic times during the process. It is of utmost importance that the efforts identified and actions to be taken are closely monitored to ensure continued progress by all involved. Losing momentum could mean jeopardizing or delaying much needed efforts in Circuit 14. The Department, through partnership with community providers and active circuit planning team members must commit to the sustainability of this plan to achieve best outcomes for the Circuit 14 community. Based on the current relationship within the Circuit 14 community and those committed to this plan this goal is achievable.

IX. RECOMMENDATIONS


The investment of resources in prevention programs is essential to the success of Florida's families. Research has proven it is more cost effective to fund front end services directed toward preventative or diversion programs rather than services, placements, or commitment facilities after the fact. The state needs to make a genuine effort to invest in these programs at all levels. An example of this is the recent cuts to the Healthy Families Florida program. It is imperative that the State of Florida fund this program at levels necessary to sustain the quality of services, expand the availability of services statewide, and enhance the program's capacity to better serve families at risk of child maltreatment, especially those experiencing domestic violence, mental health and substance abuse issues.


I. STATUS OF ADOPTION PROMOTION

The Circuit 14 Local Planning Team was provided multiple data sets by the Governor’s Office of Adoption and Child Protection related to the status of adoption. The Local Planning Team reviewed the data for Circuit 14 overall and for each of its six counties: Bay, Calhoun, Gulf, Holmes, Jackson, and Washington counties. 


The majority of adoptions finalized in Circuit 14 were completed in Bay County.





Count of Children in Out of Home Care Greater Than 12 Months on June 30, 2009




Bay being the most populous county in Circuit 14, it also has the most children in out of home care greater than 12 months.


Count of Children With Both Parents TPR'd by Length of TPR as of June 30, 2009

For the past several fiscal years, Circuit 14 has met or exceeded the state goals for the number of children adopted each year. Historically, there are a higher number of finalizations each fiscal year in Bay County than the other five counties in the Circuit. For Fiscal Year 2008-2009, there were 92 finalizations in Bay, 11 in Jackson, 8 in Holmes, 4 in Calhoun, and 2 in Gulf and Washington. As a whole, for the prior three fiscal years, Circuit 14 has exceeded our goal for finalizing adoptions.

Circuit 14 has a very successful adoptions program. Circuit 14 employs an array of adoption awareness, promotion, and recruitment activities. Children available for adoption are highlighted through the Adoption Exchange, the Adoption Information Center, and other Web sites that feature waiting children. Media campaigns, including the use of public service announcements and commercials on local television and radio, and articles in the local newspaper are in place to raise awareness of the issue of children in care.

Heart Gallery North Florida, through its traveling art display, promotes children available for adoption at various community forums. Heart Gallery North Florida began with community workshops in the summer of 2008 and resulted in the creation of a new state corporation in December 2008.

There continues to be "home finder" conference calls between the Community Based Care Lead Agencies, and Big Bend Community Based Care regularly participates in these statewide calls to promote specific children available for adoption. The Model Approach to Partnerships in Parenting (MAPP) courses offer an additional opportunity for targeted recruitment efforts.

Special events, such as adoption finalization ceremonies and activities during National Adoption Month in November provide a perfect opportunity to raise awareness of adoptions.

All prospective adoptive parents and interested parties attend an adoption orientation meeting, at which they can meet peers and adoptions staff to learn more about foster care adoption, in general. As part of the Life Management Center, Inc. or Florida Baptist Children's Home orientation, prospective parents are given an overview of the steps involved in the adoption process and general timeframes in the adoption process. Prospective parents are also given information about pre-adoption training requirements and training schedules.

All prospective adoptive families must complete the Model Approach to Partnerships in Parenting (MAPPP) training. Once a family has been identified for a child, the prospective adoptive family is provided information and trainings by the local adoption programs specific to the child's unique needs.

II. CONTINUUM OF ADOPTION PROMOTION PROGRAMS

A continuum of programs necessary for a comprehensive approach to promotion of adoption (including brief descriptions of such programs and services) §39.001(8)(b)6.f

Adoption awareness efforts – Web-based, television, newspaper, magazine and radio public service announcements that provide a backdrop for general community awareness about the children in foster care who need adoptive families. The *Explore Adoption* campaign is pre-packaged and ready to be customized and used.

Targeted recruitment efforts – Focusing on specific groups of children and teens needing homes and identifying and targeting those communities most likely to adopt these children. Descriptions of common special needs of available children will lead to target populations that should be recruited; community and faith-based initiatives; incentive programs for foster and adoptive families to recruit others from their communities; advertisements, posters or flyers at places where foster and adoptive parents typically shop or visit; Web sites such as *Explore Adoption*; etc. The *Explore Adoption* campaign is pre-packaged and ready to be used.

Child-specific recruitment efforts – Locating and matching an identified waiting child with an approved adoptive family; media or materials describing and recruiting parents for an individual child; statewide and national adoption Web sites (e.g., *Explore Adoption*, Adoption Information Center, etc.); statewide and local heart galleries; radio, newspaper or television features; “passports” or brochures featuring the child’s strengths and needs; etc.

Orientation for prospective adoptive parents – Meetings for staff to explain the adoption process and requirements for becoming an adoptive family; follow-up literature and guides; etc.

Assistance (navigating the system) for prospective adoptive parents – Consistent contact with prospective families, helpdesk for prospective families, guidebooks, brochures or paperwork that explains the process and steps that must be completed to become an approved adoptive parent, etc. *Explore Adoption* Web site has a FAQ page that would assist with this.

Pre-adoption training for prospective parents – Adoptive parent training (e.g., MAPP) and family self-assessment to determine if adoption is a feasible plan for prospective adoptive family, adoption specific training after completion of the MAPP class, etc.

Pre-adoption information for “waiting” parents (i.e., family approved for adoption) – Referrals to local adoptive parent support groups; consultation, brochures or paperwork explaining the process and steps that must be completed once a child is identified as a possible match for approved adoptive families; adoption-specific training after receiving approval to adopt; etc.

Placement case management for “pre-adoptive” parents – Match staffing, placement supervision, child history disclosure, anticipated child-specific services and training needs, etc.

Vision

Florida's highest priority is that children are raised in healthy, safe, stable, and nurturing families.

Mission

To serve as a blueprint that will be implemented to provide for the care, safety, and protection of all of Florida's children in an environment that fosters healthy social, emotional, intellectual, and physical development.

Outcome

All families and communities ensure that children are safe and nurtured and live in stable environments that promote well-being.

Goal 1

By June 30, 2015, of the children adopted, the percentage adopted in less than 24 months will be reduced from the 2008-09 rate of 40.59 to 38.09 in Bay County.

Goal 2

By June 30, 2015, of the children adopted, the percentage adopted in less than 24 months will be reduced from the 2008-09 rate of n/a to the statewide average in Calhoun County.

Goal 3

By June 30, 2015, of the children adopted, the percentage adopted in less than 24 months will be reduced from the 2008-09 rate of 25.00 to 22.5 in Gulf County.

VI. A MONITORING PLAN IMPLEMENTATION

To ensure the Circuit 14 planning team monitors the ongoing progress of the implementation of the plan a format needs to be determined and followed. It is important all of the planning and implementing partners be actively involved on a regular basis to discuss their efforts and determine how, collectively, they are taking action as a continuous process. This will provide opportunities to determine and celebrate the producing of measurable improvement in the well-being of the circuit's communities and in the performance of the programs contributing to these results.

Various Meetings

Various meetings occur within the Circuit on a routine basis which will involve members of the planning team. It is imperative for team members to remember the efforts of this plan and serve as educators and leaders in those meetings to garner support for the efforts and seek additional resources to ensure implementation.

Quarterly Meetings

Members who volunteered to take active leads with implementation efforts will complete their sections of the monitoring report template and notify the entire planning team of their progress on a quarterly basis. These notifications will serve to guide decisions about process implementation and performance. The information will then be rolled up into the monitoring reports to be submitted to the Executive Office of the Governor. It is expected that members of each effort will meet outside of the quarterly meetings to ensure progress is made. The meetings will be scheduled by the team lead and are to be held as needed.

Semi Annually Meetings

The entire planning team will convene semi annually to talk through the outline for the annual progress report. This will allow for sharing of information, informing team members of progress made so informed decision making about continued and future actions can be made, and enhancing the initial core members of the team with other participants who may desire to initiate other efforts which arise in the circuit.

VI. B ANNUAL PROGRESS REPORTING

Members who volunteered to take active leads with implementation efforts will complete their sections of the monitoring report template and notify the entire planning team of their progress on a quarterly basis. This information will then be rolled up into the monitoring reports to be submitted to the Executive Office of the Governor. Any additional information obtained during various, quarterly, or semi annual meetings can also be provided and added to the reports, as needed.

VII. BARRIERS

It is important for this plan to serve as a Circuit 14 community plan and be acknowledged and respected as such. The efforts identified, strategies put in place to achieve the efforts, and needs identified are those of the individuals with a vested interest in the local community. Members of the planning team and those taking active leads know the needs of Circuit 14 and their continued involvement and ideas to achieve the efforts must be supported by leadership outside of Circuit 14.

As with most plans and/or projects momentum comes and goes at periodic times during the process. It is of utmost importance that the efforts identified and actions to be taken are closely monitored to ensure continued progress by all involved. Losing momentum could mean jeopardizing or delaying much needed efforts in Circuit 14. The Department, through partnership with community providers and active circuit planning team members must commit to the sustainability of this plan to achieve best outcomes for the Circuit 14 community. Based on the current relationship within the Circuit 14 community and those committed to this plan this goal is achievable.

VIII. RECOMMENDATIONS

To ensure accurate reporting of information related to actual adoption information specific to each Circuit a focus should be placed on data integrity and functioning in the Florida Safe Families Network System. . To enhance adoption support a dedicated position should be developed within Circuit 14.

PART 4 - PLAN OF ACTION FOR THE SUPPORT OF ADOPTIVE FAMILIES

I. Status of Support of Adoptive Families

There are two foster/adoptive parent support groups in Circuit 14. They are the Foster/Adoptive Parent Association of Bay & Gulf Counties and the Circle of Foster & Adoptive Mentors (COFAM).

The Foster/Adoptive Parent Association meets every two months. The Associate provides support and fun activities for the families. Leadership is provided by foster and adoptive parents. Often, training is provided by the Licensing Staff of Life Management Center or community representatives during the Association meetings. Child care is also provided during training sessions by Life Management Center Licensing Staff.

COFAM meets monthly at a local restaurant during the lunch time hour. COFAM is facilitated by two individuals who have both fostered and adopted children from the Dependency system. COFAM provides support and mentoring for foster and adoptive parents.

Currently, there are no active support groups in Holmes, Washington, Jackson and Calhoun Counties. Foster and Adoptive parents in those areas have been strongly encouraged to reestablish a support group. However, little interest has been shown by foster and adoptive parent in those counties. Contacts will be made with individual parents to encourage a foster/adoptive parent to take leadership in organizing a support group. Life Management staff will provide clerical support, as well as facilitate the initial meetings if requested.

Quality and accessibility of adoption competent mental health professionals.

There are 6 Certified Adoption Competent Therapists in Circuit 14.

3 therapists serve primarily Bay and Gulf Counties

1 therapist serves primarily Jackson and Calhoun Counties

2 therapists are available to serve all six counties in Circuit 14.

Two other licensed mental health professionals will participate in the next scheduled certification training. These two mental health professional will be available to serve families throughout Circuit 14.

Educational opportunities available to adoptive parents

Adoptive parents are offered the opportunity to attend State-wide training sponsored by the Department of Children & Families, Explore America Campaign, and Florida's Adoption Information Center. Adoptive parents are provided information on the North American Council on Adoptable Children Association's annual conference.

Life Management Center provides on-going training for foster and adoptive parents throughout the year. The Recruitment and Retention Specialist develops a training calendar for the year which includes training requests from parents, training on common parenting issues as well as any updates in polices or Florida Statue. The Specialist also sends out a quarterly newsletter that includes training announcements and websites that provide additional training opportunities.

Quality, name, title and contact information of post adoptive services counselors who provide information and referral, temporary case management for emotional support, and educational advocacy.

There are no positions funded for post adoptive services in Circuit 14. Post adoptive services are provided by the Program Administrator and Program Supervisor for Adoptions through Life Management Center. Adoptive families are provided information and referrals to services as requested, as well as emotional support and/or educational advocacy. Cases that require temporary case management are assigned to an Adoption Specialists.

Adoption competent education and mental health assistance services for adoptive families – Those providing education and therapeutic services have the basic knowledge and skills to effectively work with adoptive families and to empower adoptive parents and families to provide the environment necessary for ameliorating the effects of trauma (e.g., build relationships, improve relationships, develop nurturing and attachment, etc.); campaigns to recruit professionals to seek adoption competency; etc.

Case management services for adoptive parents and children – An intake process for families to return for needed services; designated case manager to respond to adopted children and families post-legal finalization; system to notify families of continued training, adoption workshops, and support group meetings, and resource guide that includes adoption-support information and service providers; etc.

VI. MONITORING AND EVALUATION

VI. A MONITORING PLAN IMPLEMENTATION

To ensure the Circuit 14 planning team monitors the ongoing progress of the implementation of the plan a format needs to be determined and followed. It is important all of the planning and implementing partners be actively involved on a regular basis to discuss their efforts and determine how, collectively, they are taking action as a continuous process. This will provide opportunities to determine and celebrate the producing of measurable improvement in the well-being of the circuit's communities and in the performance of the programs contributing to these results.

Various Meetings

Various meetings occur within the Circuit on a routine basis which will involve members of the planning team. It is imperative for team members to remember the efforts of this plan and serve as educators and leaders in those meetings to garner support for the efforts and seek additional resources to ensure implementation.

Quarterly Meetings

Members who volunteered to take active leads with implementation efforts will complete their sections of the monitoring report template and notify the entire planning team of their progress on a quarterly basis. These notifications will serve to guide decisions about process implementation and performance. The information will then be rolled up into the monitoring reports to be submitted to the Executive Office of the Governor. It is expected that members of each effort will meet outside of the quarterly meetings to ensure progress is made. The meetings will be scheduled by the team lead and are to be held as needed.

Semi-Annually Meetings

The entire planning team will convene semi annually to talk through the outline for the annual progress report. This will allow for sharing of information, informing team members of progress made so informed decision making about continued and future actions can be made, and enhancing the initial core members of the team with other participants who may desire to initiate other efforts which arise in the circuit.

VI.B ANNUAL PROGRESS REPORTING

Members who volunteered to take active leads with implementation efforts will complete their sections of the monitoring report template and notify the entire planning team of their progress on a quarterly basis. This information will then be rolled up into the monitoring reports to be submitted to the Executive Office of the Governor. Any additional information obtained during various, quarterly, or semi annual meetings can also be provided and added to the reports, as needed.

VII. BARRIERS

It is important for this plan to serve as a Circuit 14 community plan and be acknowledged and respected as such. The efforts identified, strategies put in place to achieve the efforts, and needs identified are those of the individuals with a vested interest in the local community. Members of the planning team and those taking active leads know the needs of Circuit 14 and their continued involvement and ideas to achieve the efforts must be supported by leadership outside of Circuit 14.

As with most plans and/or projects momentum comes and goes at periodic times during the process. It is of utmost importance that the efforts identified and actions to be taken are closely monitored to ensure continued progress by all involved. Losing momentum could mean jeopardizing or delaying much needed efforts in Circuit 14. The Department, through partnership with community providers and active circuit planning team members must commit to the sustainability of this plan to achieve best outcomes for the Circuit 14 community. Based on the current relationship within the Circuit 14 community and those committed to this plan this goal is achievable.
