II. PROCESS USED TO DEVELOP THE PLAN AND PLAN UPDATE

- A. Who led the planning effort

The Circuit 7 Local Planning Team comprises many representatives of local agencies and community leaders who all have a common goal of preventing child abuse, abandonment and neglect. Reginald (Reggie) Williams leads the Local Planning Team with the support of the directors of the community based care providers in our area. Circuit 7 encompasses a four county area including Flagler, Putnam, St Johns and Volusia counties.

- B. Narrative description of the circuit and the demographics of the counties in the circuit

Circuit 7’s four county area is located in east-central Florida. The Circuit includes both rural and small urban areas and three of the four counties are bordered on the east by the Atlantic Ocean. Though all four counties have extensive agricultural interest, primary revenue flows into Volusia and St Johns counties as a result of tourism while both Flagler and Putnam counties are more reliant on agriculture. C. Brief narrative description of the membership of the planning team(s)

The Circuit 7 Local Planning Team was formed with members from each of the four counties, Flagler, Putnam, St Johns and Volusia. In order to provide depth and leadership, two subcommittees, Prevention Workgroup and Adoption Workgroup, were formed to develop the updates for each. These groups met and developed an action plan to gather current data, provide analysis of current programs and strategies, and provide a recommendation to the Local Planning Team on what strategies and goals should remain or retire from the plan.

D. Overview of the meetings held

In the beginning of Fiscal Year 2007, District 12 was transformed into Circuit 7 and gained two counties, Putnam and St Johns. Representatives from all counties (Flagler, Putnam, St Johns and Volusia) participate in the Local Planning Team effort. Current efforts from all four counties were incorporated into the last plan and those efforts that should remain will be included in the current plan. Committee meetings were held biweekly.

E. Overview of the plan development process










F. Counts of children with most serious finding of verified abuse by age




G. Counts by the array of allegations of abuse





H. Counts by the array of allegations of abuse that were verified






I. Demographics of children who were subjects of investigations (unduplicated counts)






J. Demographics and other characteristics that may be available for perpetrators







K. Counts by recommendations for services (unduplicated by child and investigation)

The Circuit 7 Local Planning Team designated various subject matter experts and interested community members to participate in the Prevention Workgroup to analyze local data, research available child abuse prevention programs, and to recommend to the Local Planning Team a course of action that best provides child prevention services in our community.

The first step was to determine the magnitude of the problem within Circuit 7. Chart A and C reflect the child maltreatment rate per 1000 children for fiscal years 2007 – 08 and 2008 – 09. The two charts depict

a downward change for all counties, except Flagler County, in the maltreatment rate from the first fiscal year to the second. Chart C also reflects far better rates than the statewide rate for THREE of the four counties. Volusia, the most populous county in the circuit, is above the statewide average and is 40% higher than the next highest county in the circuit. Matrix E details the number of unduplicated child victims based on all allegations. In Circuit 7, 14.9% of all victims are found to have verified findings. For this 14.9%, Chart F shows that the verified victims are most frequently the very young.

Charts G and H break down by type the allegations of maltreatment and the maltreatments that are verified by type. Both charts reflect family violence and substance abuse as being the top two maltreatments accounting for over 56% of all allegations. It is also recognized that frequently the two maltreatments are involved in the same incident. Consequently family violence and substance abuse merit attention in prevention activities. A review of the various maltreatments as a percent of the total was completed for each county. A comparison of the four counties in Circuit 7 did not reveal a significant difference in the type of maltreatments occurring in any individual county.

Charts in section I reflect almost no difference in gender of victims of alleged abuse. The charts do, however, reflect that white victims are by far more numerous than black or other races. However, when this is compared to the total population of children as reflected in Matrix D white victims are just 6.07% of the total population but black victims are 9.76% and “other” race is 13.66%. This data merits further study. Charts in section J regarding the demographics of alleged perpetrators, reveal the same type of data; little difference in gender, numerous white race perpetrators but under represented, as a percentage of total population and most perpetrators are over 26 years of age.

Chart K depicts a large array of services offered to the families involved with reports of alleged maltreatment. The most frequently offered are child counseling and daycare services. Substance abuse services account for about 10% of the services offered.

Charts in section P reflect the number of patients treated by drug type for the largest substance abuse provider in Volusia and Flagler counties during the fiscal years 2008 and 2009. This data set reflects a 45% increase in the number of clients treated and a disturbing trend regarding dependency on prescription drugs. This data combined with reports from Circuit Child Protective Investigators and Shelter Diversion staff indicates prescription drug abuse has become a primary issue for child safety in Volusia and Flagler counties. The National Institute on Drug Abuse research in this area reveals that 20% of the American people, 12 and older, have used prescription drugs for non-medical reasons in their lifetimes.

II. CONTINUA OF PRIMARY AND SECONDARY PREVENTION PROGRAMS

A continuum of programs necessary for a comprehensive approach to prevention of all types of child abuse, abandonment, and neglect (including brief descriptions of such programs and services) §39.001(8)(b)6.f

It is the intent of this planning effort to prevent child abuse, abandonment, and neglect before it ever occurs. Thus, for the purpose of this prevention plan, the continuum of programs (necessary for a comprehensive approach to prevention of all types of child abuse, abandonment, and neglect) focuses on the first two of the three levels of prevention and prevention-focused strategies:

II.A. CONTINUUM OF PRIMARY/UNIVERSAL PREVENTION PROGRAMS AND SERVICES *Accessible by the general public prior to the occurrence of child abuse and neglect*

Community Development – Community capacity building, community partnerships, etc.

Community Support for Families – Family resource centers, community events and fairs, etc.

Family Supportive Programs/Services – Voluntary home visiting; developmental screening; affordable, accessible quality childcare; before and after school programs; recreational activities; parent support groups; parent education classes; marriage and relationship counseling and support services; etc.

Information and Referral and Helplines – Access to information about community and social services available for families including early health and development services, etc.

Public Awareness and Education Campaigns – Highlighting risk/protective factors, child development, positive parenting, child safety, domestic violence and substance abuse prevention, bullying prevention, etc.

Workforce – Family-friendly workplace policies, livable wage policies, etc.

II.B. CONTINUUM OF SECONDARY/SELECTED PREVENTION PROGRAMS AND SERVICES Targeted to families with multiple risk factors prior to the occurrence of child Abuse and Neglect

Adult Education – High School Diploma, GED, job training, ESL classes, mentoring for high-risk youth, etc.

Community Development – Community building, community partnerships, etc.

Community Support for Families – Food banks, clothing banks, housing assistance, transportation, emergency assistance, food stamps, quality childcare, etc.

Concrete Services – Referrals for (or provision of) clothing, food, utility payments, housing assistance, transportation, emergency assistance, respite care, etc.

Family Supportive Programs/Services – Voluntary home visiting (e.g., for families that meet Healthy Families Florida and Healthy Start criteria), parent education classes, teen parenting services, parent self-help support groups, domestic violence supports, substance abuse and mental health services, respite care (including families with disabilities), counseling for adults and children, developmental assessments, etc.

Workforce – Family-friendly workplace policies and livable wage policies, etc.

II.C. FLORIDA'S ECOLOGICAL FRAMEWORK


Florida's ecological framework serves to organize the potential influence and impact of prevention strategies and is based on the following assumptions:

- Children and families exist as part of an ecological system. This means that prevention strategies must target interventions at multiple levels: the individual, the relationship, the community, and society.
- Primary responsibility for the development and well being of children lies within the family, and all segments of society must support families as they raise their children.
- Assuring the well being of all families is the cornerstone of a healthy society and requires universal access to support programs and services.

It comprises four levels of influence:


1. **Individual level:** At this level are **parent and child characteristics** – emotional and psychological characteristics, temperament, behavior, problem-solving skills, health conditions, and beliefs – that can affect the rearing of children. Interventions at this level are often designed to affect an individual's social skills, cognitive skills, behavior and immediate circumstances.
2. **Relationship level: Interpersonal relationships** with peers, intimate partners, and family members shape an individual's behavior and range of experiences. This level contains factors such as family size, cohesion, communication, support, conflict, and stability that directly affect the child and influence the way in which adults care for children and each other. Interventions at this level are often designed to improve a person's ability to engage in positive and constructive relationships, especially within the immediate family.

3. **Community level:** Families operate within **neighborhoods and communities**. Factors that characterize this level include availability of supports (governmental and community), stability, violence, poverty, disorganization, and isolation; all affect the ability of families and communities to nurture their children. Interventions at the community level are typically designed to impact the climate, systems and policies in a given (usually geographic) setting.
4. **Societal level:** The **larger culture** in which families operate and children are raised plays a significant role in how families care for their young. Religious or cultural belief systems, values such as self-reliance and family privacy, and the cultural acceptance of media violence and corporal punishment of children affect the way in which parents raise their children and the ways in which communities support families. Interventions at the societal level typically involve collaborations of multiple partners to change laws and policies as well as to determine and influence societal norms and harmful cultural belief systems.

IV.A. PRIMARY/UNIVERSAL PREVENTION STRATEGIES – PROGRAMS ACCESSIBLE BY THE GENERAL PUBLIC PRIOR TO THE OCCURRENCE OF CHILD ABUSE AND NEGLECT

It is recognized that the data gathered for primary prevention strategies was gathered through survey and therefore will have some margin of error. However, based on the data gathered, certain extrapolations can be made for Circuit 7 overall as well as specific counties within the Circuit.

Adult Education: All counties reported services that address Job Training, Mentoring of High Risk Youth and other miscellaneous services. No county reported services in adult education that addressed high school diplomas, general equivalency diplomas or English as a second language classes. Only Volusia County responded that services were available for adult literacy.

Community Development: All counties reported services that address community involvement programs, community partnerships and other miscellaneous services. No county reported services in social advocacy groups. Only Volusia County responded that services were available for community capacity building.

Community Support: All counties reported services that address family resource centers and other miscellaneous services. No county reported services in clothing banks, emergency assistance facilities and hotlines and registries. Only St Johns and Flagler counties reported services for community events and fairs and quality child care centers. St Johns County reported services for food banks.

Concrete Services: All counties reported services that address food, transportation, emergency assistance, health care, prenatal care, insurance (Health, Dental, Vision, etc), respite care and other miscellaneous services. Putnam County reported services in utility payments and housing assistance. Only St Johns County reported services for food stamps, other temp assistance.

Family Support Programs: All counties reported services that address developmental screening and assessments, parent self-help and support groups, parent education classes and teen parenting services. No county reported services in voluntary home visiting, affordable, accessible quality childcare and after school programs, recreational activities, domestic violence supports, substance abuse services, mental health services (Individual, Family, Group) and services working with development of interpersonal relationship skills. St Johns and Volusia counties reported services that address marriage/relationship counseling/support services.

Information and Referral Helplines: All counties reported services that address information about community and social services.

Public Awareness & Education Campaigns: All counties reported services that address highlighting risk/protective factors, developmental assets, etc, child development, positive parenting and bullying prevention. No county reported services in domestic violence and substance abuse prevention. St Johns County reported services that address child safety.

Workforce: All counties reported services that address family-friendly workplace policies. No county reported services in career counseling, career development, comprehensive job assistance centers and Job banks, career fairs, career information, search resource centers, etc. Volusia County did report services that address livable wage policies.

Though the detail above provides reports of many available services in Circuit 7, it also points out many service gaps as well. The team recognizes that some of these service gaps are caused by organizations that failed to respond to the statewide survey or listed their services in other categories that may have also applied in the gap areas. Both of these causes are reporting in nature rather than a true service gap. It is the intent of the team to investigate these recognized service gaps to determine if indeed no services exist. As the team confirms service gaps then strategies to address them can be developed.

IV.B. SECONDARY/SELECTED PREVENTION STRATEGIES – PROGRAMS TARGETED TO FAMILIES WITH MULTIPLE RISK FACTORS FOR CHILD ABUSE PRIOR TO THE OCCURRENCE OF CHILD ABUSE AND NEGLECT

Note: Secondary prevention is geared to communities and families who are vulnerable and at risk of child maltreatment (e.g., have multiple risk factors – parent age, poverty, substance abuse, domestic violence, maternal depression). Targeted strategies assist these vulnerable groups with the goal of preventing child maltreatment from ever occurring in the first place.

It is recognized that the data gathered for primary prevention strategies was gathered through survey and therefore will have some margin of error. However, based on the data gathered, certain extrapolations can be made for Circuit 7 overall as well as specific counties within the Circuit.

Adult Education: St Johns County reported services that address mentoring for high risk youth and other miscellaneous services. No other services in this category were reported by any county.

Community Development: All counties reported services that address community partnerships. Putnam and St Johns counties reported services that address community capacity building. St Johns County reported services that address social advocacy groups. Putnam County reported services that address community involvement programs.

Community Support: Putnam, St Johns and Volusia counties reported services that address family resource centers. Putnam and St Johns counties reported services that address community events and fairs. St Johns and Volusia counties reported services that address emergency assistance facilities. Volusia County reported services that address quality child care centers. No county reported services that address food banks, hotlines and registries or donation programs.

Concrete Services: All counties reported services that address health care. St Johns County reported services that address utility payments, housing assistance, emergency assistance, food stamps or other

temporary assistance and respite care. St Johns and Putnam counties reported services that address transportation. No county reported services that address food and prenatal care.

Family Support Programs: All counties reported services that address voluntary home visiting, parent education classes and marriage/relationship counseling/support services. Putnam County reported services that address developmental screening and assessments. Volusia County reported services that address affordable, accessible quality childcare and after school programs. Putnam and St Johns counties reported services that address Parent self-help and support groups. St Johns and Volusia counties reported services that address teen parenting services and mental health services (Individual, Family, Group). Putnam and Volusia counties reported services that address domestic violence supports. No counties reported services that address recreational activities.

Information and Referral Helplines: All counties reported services that address access to information about community and social services available for families.

Public Awareness & Education Campaigns: All counties reported services that address highlighting risk/protective factors, developmental assets, etc, child safety and domestic violence and substance abuse prevention. Flagler and Volusia counties reported services that address child development and positive parenting. St Johns and Volusia counties reported services that address bullying prevention.

Workforce: All counties reported services that address some miscellaneous services. No county reported services that address family-friendly workplace policies, livable wage policies, career counseling, career development, comprehensive job assistance centers or job banks, career fairs, career information, search resource centers, etc.

Though the detail above provides reports of many available services in Circuit 7, it also points out many service gaps as well. The team recognizes that some of these service gaps are caused by organizations that failed to respond to the statewide survey or listed their services in other categories that may have also applied in the gap areas. Vision

Florida's highest priority is that children are raised in healthy, safe, stable, and nurturing families.

Mission

To serve as a blueprint that will be implemented to provide for the care, safety, and protection of all of Florida's children in an environment that fosters healthy social, emotional, intellectual, and physical development.

Outcome

All families and communities ensure that children are safe and nurtured and live in stable environments that promote well being.

Circuit Goal 1

Children and teenagers are free from abuse, abandonment, and neglect and have safe, loving and permanent homes as measured by a reduction in the circuit-level child abuse rate from the fiscal year 2008-09 of 10.32 to a rate of 7.2 per 1,000 children by 30 June 2015.

County Flagler Goal 1.1

Children and teenagers are free from abuse, abandonment, and neglect and have safe, loving and permanent homes as measured by a reduction in the circuit-level child abuse rate from the fiscal year 2008-09 of 8.57 to a rate of 7.08 per 1,000 children by 30 June 2015.

County Putnam Goal 1.2

Children and teenagers are free from abuse, abandonment, and neglect and have safe, loving and permanent homes as measured by a reduction in the circuit-level child abuse rate from the fiscal year 2008-09 of 8.58 to a rate of 7.09 per 1,000 children by 30 June 2015.

County St Johns Goal 1.3




Chart 2-Comparison of the median length of stay during the period July 2008 through June 2009 for children whose adoptions were finalized by County and Statewide




Chart 3-Comparison of foster children in care 17+ months who were adopted by the end of FY 08-09 by County and Statewide




Chart 4-Comparison of children in foster care 17+ months FY 08-09 who became legally free for adoption within six months by County and Statewide





Chart 5-Comparison of the children legally free for adoption on 1 July 2008, the percent adopted by 30 June 2009 by County and Statewide

Chart 6-Number of adoptions finalized FY 2008-2009 by County




Chart 7-Number of children adopted in FY 08-09 by Length of Time of TPR




Chart 8-Of the Children Legally Free for Adoption on June 30, 2009, the Length of Time since becoming legally free for Adoption

Chart 9-Percent of children adopted by County – by relatives, by foster parents and by recruited parents.




Chart 10-Length of Time Children Legally Free for Adoption in Circuit 7 with No Identified Placement as of the end of FY 08-09




Chart 11-Number of Children Available for Adoption by Race in Circuit 7 with No Identified Placement as of the end of FY 08-09




Chart 12-Number of Children in Circuit 7 Available for Adoption by Age with No Identified Placement as of the end of FY 08-09




Chart 13-Number of children in out of home care for 12 months or more on 30 June 2009 by County





Chart 14-Number of children with a goal of APPLA as of 30 June 2009 by County



The Circuit 7 Local Planning Team designated various subject matter experts and interested community members to participate in the Adoptions Workgroup to analyze local adoption data, research available programs, and to recommend to the Local Planning Team a course of action that best provides adoption promotion and adoption support services in our community.

Based on the data listed above, Circuit 7 is continuously reaching or exceeding the federal and state performance measures on Adoption. Chart 1 indicates the percent of children adopted during fiscal year 08-09 less than 24 months of entering out of home care. Chart 2 indicates the median length of stay for children whose adoptions were finalized. Based on this data, Circuit 7 finalized adoptions in a timely manner compared to the statewide average. Again, Chart 3 and 4 illustrates children, in out of home care more than 17 months, were adopted by the end of the fiscal year and became legally free for adoption within six months. In Chart 5, the percent of children legally free in the beginning of the fiscal year and adopted by the end of the fiscal year, indicating that two of the four counties exceeded the statewide average. Chart 6 reveals the number of adoptions finalized per county which surpasses the contractual goals set by the state. Chart 7 and 8 show an average of children legally free for adoption within the fiscal year 08-09 was between 12 to 24 months for Circuit 7. Chart 9 displays the children finalized by county in fiscal year 08-09, by Adoptive Family Type. This chart demonstrates a greater number of children are adopted by relatives or foster parents. However, there has been a significant increase in recruited families in Volusia County. In Chart 10, the number of children available for adoption in Circuit 7 by length of time waiting to be adopted is demonstrated. There are 13 children who have been waiting over 48 months. This is a continued concern, though the number of children has decreased since fiscal year 07-08 from 37 children waiting over 48 months. Chart 11 and 12 explain the demographics of children who are available for adoption with no identified placement by race and age. The greater number of youth still waiting is over the age of 9 and caucasian. Lastly, Charts 13 and 14 show the number of children in out of home care for 12 months or more and with the goal of Another Planned Permanent Living Arrangement (APPLA) by county. These statistics indicate that there is a significant number of youth in Volusia County who have a goal of APPLA and have remained in foster care more than 12 months.

Research from various child welfare organizations, such as the Casey Foundation and the North American Council on Adoptable Children (NACAC), reveals that older children are much harder to place with adoptive families. These difficult placements should be targeted with effective adoption promotions. The Circuit's priority will be recruiting families willing to provide loving, safe homes for children older than nine.

In the 18 month plan for Promotion of Adoption and Support of Adoptive Families for Circuit 7, one of the plans of action was to coordinate a Teen Focus Group on Adoption Promotion and Support. The purpose of the Teen Focus Group was to gain insight into the youth's perspective and provide input on how to better serve the children/adolescents who are freed for adoption and in the foster care system. This included ideas for adoption promotion events, media outlets, and families they are interested in building relationships. We were also interested in their thoughts regarding placement, life skills, and preparation for adulthood.

The selected committee members were trained by focus group expert, Joan Walsh. It was explained that a focus group is a form of qualitative research and highly effective in understanding the ideas and feelings of the group. The goal was to build a model that best suits the customer. In this case, the "ideal state" of what an adoptive family home and/or situation would be for those youth in foster care.

Questions were asked in an interactive setting to selected youth with a goal of Adoption or APPLA placed in Volusia, Flagler, Putnam, and St. Johns counties. The adolescents were sorted by gender and age 11-14 males; 11-14 females; 15-18 males; and 15-18 females. The committee developed questions

pertaining to the following areas of interest: Media /Entertainment; Education; Working/Career; Spiritual Life; Relationship with past; Relationship with the adoptive family; Money/Material Goods; Relationship with yourself.

A common theme identified from the Teen Focus Group was that all the youth were vulnerable, but this manifested in different ways based on their age and gender. They all had well developed gauges for sincerity. Their perspective of adoption meant “New Life”. This may explain why some of the older children who had a significant relationship with their biological family, did not want to be adopted. It may take away from what they already knew. Most of the youth demonstrated that they had the ability to bond and stay connected. It was an exciting reunion for some of the children who were in the same foster placements at one point in their life. There was a consistent “network” between foster peers.

Each group of teens found that it was important to maintain a relationship with their birth family, especially siblings (adopted or not). They wanted a voice in the adoption process and no surprises. One of the youth stated, “They know all about me, why can’t I know about them?” The younger groups were more open to adoption than the older groups. They were aware of the failed attempts at trial matches with prospective adoptive families and that this was painful. It was rejection, yet, there was still a sense of resilience. A contributing factor may be that each group was in agreement that spirituality was an important part of their lives. Some of the older youth had explored various belief systems and there was a strong need to “be allowed to be me”.

The youth were confused about their permanency options. There were misconceptions about the support and benefits of the Independent Living (IL) Program. Some were not sure how to qualify and at what age. Some of the older teens were not aware that they may qualify for the Road To Independence (RTI) if adopted at the age of 16 or older.

Interestingly, all of the adolescents could articulate their failings and imperfections. They voiced that they liked themselves; however their actions did not always echo this. There was an overall need for acceptance and they could form firm conclusions about “who they are”. Comparing the groups, it was found that the older groups were markedly different from the younger groups. The older teen females appeared “jaded” and cynical while the older boys were withdrawn. The younger groups of both genders were pleasant and seemed to have hope of a “new life”.

Based on the findings, it is suggested that the committee continue to coordinate Teen Focus Groups periodically to address other issues regarding the child welfare system. Our action for the five year plan is to implement a new process to include the involvement of our teens in the adoption promotion process.

II. CONTINUUM OF ADOPTION PROMOTION PROGRAMS

A continuum of programs necessary for a comprehensive approach to promotion of adoption (including brief descriptions of such programs and services) §39.001(8)(b)6.f

The adoption services listed immediately below are standard services provided by the community based care organizations that serve all four counties in Circuit 7, (Family Integrity Program and Community Partnership for Children).

Adoption awareness efforts – Web-based, television, newspaper, magazine and radio public service announcements that provide a backdrop for general community awareness about the children in foster care that need adoptive families. The *Explore Adoption* campaign is pre-packaged and ready to be customized and used.

Targeted recruitment efforts – Focusing on specific groups of children and teens needing homes and identifying and targeting those communities most likely to adopt these children. Descriptions of common special needs of available children will lead to target populations that should be recruited; community and faith-based initiatives; incentive programs for foster and adoptive families to recruit others from their communities; advertisements, posters or flyers at places where foster and adoptive parents typically shop or visit; Web sites such as *Explore Adoption*; etc. The *Explore Adoption* campaign is pre-packaged and ready to be used.

Child-specific recruitment efforts – Locating and matching an identified waiting child with an approved adoptive family; media or materials describing and recruiting parents for an individual child; statewide and national adoption Web sites (e.g., *Explore Adoption*, Adoption Information Center, etc.); statewide and local heart galleries; radio, newspaper or television features; “passports” or brochures featuring the child’s strengths and needs; etc.

Orientation for prospective adoptive parents – Meetings for staff to explain the adoption process and requirements for becoming an adoptive family; follow-up literature and guides; etc.

Assistance (navigating the system) for prospective adoptive parents – Consistent contact with prospective families, helpdesk for prospective families, guidebooks, brochures or paperwork that explains the process and steps that must be completed to become an approved adoptive parent, etc. *Explore Adoption* Web site has an FAQ page that would assist with this.

Pre-adoption training for prospective parents – Adoptive parent training (e.g., MAPP) and family self-assessment to determine if adoption is a feasible plan for prospective adoptive family, adoption specific training after completion of the MAPP class, etc.

Pre-adoption information for “waiting” parents (i.e., family approved for adoption) – Referrals to local adoptive parent support groups; consultation, brochures or paperwork explaining the process and steps that must be completed once a child is identified as a possible match for approved adoptive families; adoption-specific training after receiving approval to adopt; etc.

Placement case management for “pre-adoptive” parents – Match staffing, placement supervision, child history disclosure, anticipated child-specific services and training needs, etc.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION FOR PROGRAMS CUIRRENTLY PROMOTING ADOPTION:

Many adoptive families continue to come from the pool of foster parents that take care of our dependent children daily. Many of these potential adoptive families first hear of these wonderful children through the websites and activities listed above. Frequency of Provision can be found within each program description if the data is available or applicable. The information is not applicable within some programs. There is certain data that could not be obtained and/or available to determine "Number of Families Served" for these programs. Below lists the number of prospective adoptive families who inquired, completed MAPP, and assigned to an adoption homefinder/recruiter.

In fiscal year 2008-2009, both Community Partnership for Children and the Family Integrity Program surpassed both state performance measure goals and contractual goals for the number of adoptions finalized. Community Partnership for Children completed 150 adoptions last year. This was well over the fiscal year 2008-2009 state performance goal of 133. Family Integrity Program finalized 26 adoptions exceeding the state performance goal of 17. Out of those Circuit 7 finalizations, there were 29 recruited families who adopted.

Since March 2009, there have been 81 prospective adoptive families inquiring about special needs children through Community Partnership for Children. There are currently 69 families who are assigned to an Adoption Homefinder/Recruiter with completed approved adoption home studies. Out of those families, 61 families completed MAPP training through Community Partnership for Children. There are currently 14 families who are registered to complete MAPP in anticipation of becoming an approved adoptive family in January 2010.

Since 2007, approximately 84 families have contacted FIP in hopes of becoming an adoptive family. Out of the 84, 30 families have completed MAPP and have an approved adoptive home study. Out of the last MAPP class, five families are in the process of having an adoptive home study completed. For the upcoming class, 13 families have contacted FIP to inquire about the adoption process.

IMPACT OF PROGRAMS

The current impact of these programs for fiscal year 2008-2009 is that we have notably increased the number of recruited family adoptions. We have also established several working relationships with the faith based community in order to increase awareness and assist through sponsorships of our adoption matching events and educational/training for adoptive parents.

SOURCE OF FUNDING

The primary source of funding for both Adoption Promotion and Adoption Support Services is predominately received through Federal and State funding such as: Title XIX Medicaid Administration, State of Florida General Revenue Funds and Medwaiver, IV-E Maintenance Adoption Subsidy, Promoting Safe and Stable Families (PSSF) IV-B-2, and Adoption Exchange Association. Most of these services are dependent on the general appropriations through the State of Florida. The agencies also receive funding through charitable contributions from individuals and local businesses within the communities. The private adoption agency, Embrace By Grace is funded by the consumer.

COST EFFECTIVENESS

For both Adoption Promotion and Adoption Support Services, it is imperative that the foster children we serve will obtain and maintain permanency. The Adoption Promotion programs are focused on finding a 'forever family' for those foster children who are available for adoption but are not placed in an identified home. The Adoption Support program is designed to concentrate on maintaining the existing adoptive family unit so that the child will not return to the dependency system.

In 2006, the Legislature appropriated additional funds for family foster care with an increase of \$60 a month. The new rates for traditional foster care are allotted based on the child's age and level of care. At a minimum, a child, 0-5 years old, placed in a traditional foster family home, will receive \$429 a month. At a maximum for traditional foster care, a teenager, 13 years and older, would receive \$515 a month. Medical foster care board rates increased to \$504 per month. For those children and teenagers who need higher levels of care based on their physical, developmental and mental health needs, the cost will exceed the highest traditional foster board rate. For example, the cost of care for a child placed in a dual diagnosed residential treatment center, the agency could pay up to \$363 a day or \$10, 890 a month.

According to 409.166(4)(b) F.S., Children within the child welfare system; adoption assistance program, states, "The department shall provide adoption assistance to the adoptive parents, subject to specific appropriation, in the amount of \$5,000 annually, paid on a monthly basis, for the support and maintenance of a child until the 18th birthday of such child or in an amount other than \$5,000 annually as determined by the adoptive parents and the department and memorialized in a written agreement between

the adoptive parents and the department.” On the average, a negotiation between the agencies and adoptive parents for adoption subsidy would be based on 80% of the traditional foster board rate and up to \$5000 per year or \$417 a month. This amount, at its highest, still does not exceed the amount of money that it costs to care for a child in the dependency system.

Based on the information above, a child who remains or returns to foster care will exceed the cost of a child who is adopted. The range of services in both adoption programs, promotion and support, is more cost-effective compared to a child remaining or returning to foster care.

IV. PLAN PRIORITIES

As population count shows on page 1, there is an extreme volatility when there is a percentage for small populations. We must have some caution with the indicators. A review of the data as a percent of the total was completed for each county. A comparison of the four counties in Circuit 7 did not reveal a significant difference occurring in any individual county. There was only one item which could be distinguished per county, Priority 1. The other 2 priorities are needs in all counties. We must also take into account the frequency of court hearings per county and the legal processes. (i.e. Flagler, St. John’s, and Putnam Counties hold court less frequently than Volusia County and the population served is less.) If one case with 5 children leads to Adoption in Flagler County, it will skew the results.

VI.A. MONITORING PLAN IMPLEMENTATION

In January and July of each year, the Prevention Subcommittee team members and implementing partners will talk through the outline for the annual progress report. At these scheduled times, changes in direction, new initiatives, barriers to success and program outcomes will be discussed. Suggested changes to the plan will then be shared with the entire Prevention Team for their input, assistance and sanction. The final results of these discussions will be included in the annual report to the Executive Office of the Governor.

VII. BARRIERS

A description of barriers to the accomplishment of a comprehensive approach to the promotion of adoption. §39.001(8)(b)6.i

1. The state of Florida forbids anyone who is homosexual to adopt a child. However, there is no law discriminating against gay/lesbian adults becoming a foster parent. This becomes an issue if a child free for adoption has been in a foster home for a substantial time and has established emotional ties.
2. Adoption Exchange System does not have a 'reason type' to place a child on hold related to an adoption disruption and/or due to therapeutic reasons.
3. Some teenagers are reluctant to attend these events as it may be perceived as being on display or rejection if a parent is not interested
4. The target population is too general and not specific to our client population (teenagers). Need to focus on child specific recruitment and those populations who would adopt an older child. (i.e. empty nesters, teachers, social workers, ...).
5. Appropriations for maintenance adoption subsidy must keep pace with our success in getting children adopted through the state.

6. The age and behaviors of a special needs child may impact the prospective adoptive parent(s)' decision to adopt.
7. Siblings are being separated when first placed in out-of-home care due to the lack of foster homes willing to take sibling groups. Thus, separation sibling staffing and bonding assessments are required for the purposes of adoption after the children have been in their separate placements for a substantial amount of time. Recruitment efforts pertaining to foster care should be focused on the need for temporary placements for our special needs children, not the needs of the foster parent to subsequently adopt.
8. The length of time after the Termination of Parental Rights for the appeal process.

VIII. RECOMMENDATIONS

Recommendations for changes that can be accomplished only at the state program level or by legislative action. §39.001(8)(b)6.j

1. Adoption Exchange System does not have a 'reason type' to place a child on hold related to an adoption disruption and/or due to therapeutic reasons. Recommend the Department of Children and Families add a reason type to Adoption Exchange System that relates to disruption.
2. The Circuit 7 Local Planning Team will continue to contact local and state legislators to promote the increase of funding for prevention programs statewide.
3. The state of Florida forbids anyone who is homosexual to adopt a child. However, there is no law discriminating against gay/lesbian adults becoming a foster parent. This becomes an issue if a child free for adoption has been in a foster home for a substantial time and has established emotional ties. Recommend that the Department advocates with state legislators to change the law and allow homosexuals, individuals or couples to adopt a child.
4. Appropriations for maintenance adoption subsidy must keep pace with our success in getting children adopted through the state. Recommend the Department continue to advocate for increasing the Maintenance Adoption Subsidy for our adoptive families.

Part 4 – PLAN FOR THE SUPPORT OF ADOPTIVE FAMILIES

I. STATUS OF SUPPORT OF ADOPTIVE FAMILIES

Status of support of adoptive families (to be based upon such areas as the quantity and quality of adoptive parent support groups; quantity and accessibility of adoption competent mental health professionals; educational opportunities available for adoptive parents; and quantity of post adoption services counselors who provide information and referral, temporary case management for emotional support, and educational advocacy).

In fiscal year 07-08, the Adoption Local Planning Team conducted a survey with adoptive families. There were 49 families that had adopted children 9 ½ years old or older who were selected randomly for a telephone survey. Of the 49, 31 families were contacted and provided information regarding the family characteristics and the type of services required by post-adoptive families. 58% of the respondent families were licensed foster parents at the time the children were placed with the family. 58% of the respondent families are Caucasian, 35.5% were African-American and 6.5% were Hispanic. Almost half (48.4%) of all the parents were in the 45 to 54 age range at time of placement which was by far the most prevalent age group. The survey revealed that 64.5% of the adoptive families knew the children prior to placement in their homes. Of these families, 45% were relatives. Other significant mechanisms for knowing the child prior to placement included knowing the prior foster placement family and being friends with the child or child's family.

When the surveyed families were asked “why did you adopt an older child?” the responses fell into 3 primary areas. First, many of the families responded that they were relatives and cared about the children. Next were foster families who stated that they had raised the children for quite some time, fell in love with them and adopted them when they became available. The third preponderant response was adoptive parents got to know the children through various activities such as mentoring, teaching, visiting, mutual friends, etc... and found themselves caring deeply for the children. For the adoptive families that provided these responses, familiarity and caring for the child was a far more important factor than age in their adoptive decision. A few respondents stated that they were older and wanted to help children. These respondents felt that it was only right for them to adopt an older child.

When these families were asked how they came to know about Florida's adoption program, approximately a third (35.7%) answered they found out through being foster parents or were relatives with custody and the case manager discussed adoption options with them. The next most prevalent answer was that they knew either a foster family or knew of an available foster child and that caused them to inquire about the adoption process. About 16% of the respondents independently decided they wanted to become adoptive parents and came to know about the adoption program through inquiry and research. When asked for recommendations on how to motivate prospective adoptive parents to adopt older children the most prevalent suggestions were: Explain the advantages of older children over younger children such as they can entertain themselves, it is easier to go on vacations, and more mature activities and interests. Have the children communicate to prospective parents how much they want to be adopted and how much they can appreciate what is done for them. Also, “from the heart” testimonials from adoptive parents on the rewards of adopting older children would be motivating. Finally, make sure that the training of prospective parents is thorough when addressing the needs and issues that available, older children may have so that these parents are well prepared to deal with them. Such issues may include feelings of abandonment, defensive behavior resulting from the abuse they suffered and the grieving of their lost family.

When the respondents were quizzed regarding what post-adoptive services they had taken advantage of, there were many mentioned. Several of the most prevalent were the adoption assistance payments, tuition waivers and assistance from the Guardian Ad Litem office. Many of the adoptive families had accessed mental health services from various mental health providers in the community. Services that the respondent families felt were needed foremost but are not readily available were counseling for foster children in post adoptive homes specific to their issues which should include grief counseling and reduced delay in accessing mental health services. Other suggestions included but were not limited to adoption support groups, increase in adoption subsidy and the subsidizing of day care expenses.

As the survey reflects, the needs of adopted children and their families do not end when the adoption is legally finalized. Many families, especially those who adopt older children from the foster care system, face extra challenges. Post-adoption services provide families with critical resources necessary to strengthen their bonds, stabilize their families, and continue to provide secure and loving permanent homes for their children. Current available resources range widely as found in the post-adoptive family survey. Other services could include parent support groups, respite care, education and training, lending libraries, mentoring and buddy systems, warm lines, plus mental health and other medical services.

Adoptive families have let us know additional service needs such as adoption specific counseling, grief counseling and reduced wait lists for mental health services that if met would assist in this goal. The team will work toward this goal by endeavoring to build community coalitions that work to create sustainable post-adoption services through a combination of grassroots organizing, public awareness campaigns, and advocacy efforts. Data at a county level has never been collected.

A Post Adoption Specialist (PAS) position was created to assist in the efforts of providing continuous support to families who have adopted and are living in Circuit 7. Adoptive families are provided the PAS contact information prior to finalization. On existing finalization cases, the PAS has sent mailings about the new program to adoptive families receiving a subsidy through the state. The agencies' website also contains information of who to contact for assistance. The core components of the PAS:

- Single Point of Access for information and inquiries regarding post adoption services
- Assessing the service needs of adoptive children and families
- Providing emotional support during crisis
- Completing referrals for needed services
- Assessing requests for increases in existing maintenance adoption subsidies and medical subsidies
- Advocate and guide families when working with educational, medical and mental health providers
- Facilitate training for service providers in the area so that they may become adoption competent
- Act as a liaison for the parent adoptive support groups
- Create post-adoption cases on FSFN and document the agencies efforts to stabilize the family.

The PAS has partnered with the East Central Florida Foster-Adopt Parent Association to conduct support groups. There are monthly meetings in Volusia County which alternate between the Eastside and Westside of the county. The PAS sends an Adoption News Letter, Families Uniting, to

all adoptive families with the time/location/date of support groups on a quarterly basis. The information is also on the Community Partnership for Children agency website. Future plans to create support groups within the Flagler, Putnam, and St. John's counties are being developed through this action plan.

Since July 1, 2008, the Post Adoption Specialist has received 99 calls from families requesting post adoption services. The PAS has been tracking the types of calls received from adoptive parents and services needed for the family.

One of the most concerning type of call is the family requesting that their child be removed from their home due to the child's behavior. There have been 25 calls related to this type of request. The contributing factor, based on the families' statements, is that they are unable to "handle" their child's behaviors. Out of those 25 calls, 3 resulted in adoption dissolution, 2 of which were non-jurisdictional cases. The outcome of the other 22 children is: 7 of the children were placed in a group home; 5 placed with a family friend or relative; 5 placed in foster care; and 5 remain in home, hesitantly.

There were 18 calls which resulted in submitting a referral for counseling through Neighbor To Family Adoption Overlay Program and ADAPT therapeutic services. Another 18 calls were requests for increase in maintenance subsidy. 9 calls were related to Medicaid transfer to another state, Interstate Compact Adoption Medicaid Assistance (ICAMA). 5 calls were issues with Medicaid cancellation. 4 were requesting a Social Security change. There were 10 who requested the State Benefit College Tuition Waiver. Lastly, 10 calls requested the Adoption Benefits for State Employees.

The team decided to look deeper into the adoptive children's behaviors and barriers the adoptive families were faced with. Of the 99 families that the PAS has worked with, 4 children had a diagnosis of Autism in some form and 6 children with Fetal Alcohol on some part of the spectrum. This 10% of the population may appear to be a small percentage; however, it becomes frustrating for families when services are not available for specialized diagnosis. Based on what has been reported to the PAS and research by the PAS, when a child has a diagnosis of Fetal Alcohol or Autism, Medicaid will not pay for therapy or any behavioral services. When more than one diagnosis is present, the principal diagnosis is listed first. If Autism is not listed first, the child is not eligible for Agency for Persons with Disabilities (APD) or Drug Abuse and Mental Health (ADM) services. Public School system is not equipped to handle a child with Autism and physical aggression. Yet, if Autism is not listed as the principal diagnosis getting the child in a private school for Autism is impossible if wanting to use the McKay Scholarship.

If a child has been diagnosed with Autism or Fetal Alcohol as the principal diagnosis they are eligible for APD and CMS services. However, an application has to be made for APD services and the waiting list is years long due to lack of funds.

Children's Medical Services (CMS) can offer physical care, neurological care and some behavioral services. Psychiatric medication management is available to the child. However, medication does not help with the Autism and Fetal Alcohol child.

In 2009, Community Partnership for Children began working with one service provider, Neighbor to Family to create a program specifically for adoptive families, The Adoption Overlay Program. The PAS refers adoptive families, who are in need of in-home services, to the Adoption

Overlay Program for family counseling, individual counseling, and Children’s Targeted Case Management. Circuit 7 has also been involved in the Statewide Adoption Competency project so that more clinical therapists become adoption competent in order to work with the family as a whole and not just the adopted child. All service providers listed below in each county were informed of this training. The service providers who have signed up for this training to cover all counties include:

- Neighbor To Family
- Devereux of Florida
- Children’s Home Society
- Putnam Behavioral
- Adoption and Family Support Center
- St. John’s County Mental Health

The ultimate goal of the Local Planning Team is to provide adoptive families with increased stability and preserved adoptions as a result of increased access to quality post-adoption services. The team will work toward this goal by endeavoring to build community coalitions that work to create sustainable post-adoption services through a combination of grassroots organizing, public awareness campaigns, and advocacy efforts

II. CONTINUUM OF ADOPTION SUPPORT PROGRAMS

The adoption services listed immediately below are standard services that each community based care organization that service all four counties in Circuit 7, (Family Integrity Program and Community Partnership for Children) is currently working on if not already established and shown in the following matrix.

Adoptive parent and teen support groups – Small group opportunities for parents and teens that are accessible; configured and meeting as often as appropriate for the languages, cultures and needs of the participants in our communities; provision of support from umbrella organizations and qualified facilitators where appropriate (e.g., teen support groups); etc.

Education and training opportunities for adoptive parents – Education and training related to adoption issues, with an emphasis on strategies for handling loss, grief, relationship building, and “acting out” behaviors; skill-building to equip adoptive parents with the skills needed to meet the specific and developing needs of children (e.g., fetal alcohol, substance abuse, autism, etc.); providing adoption resource centers, lending libraries, newsletters, annual adoption conferences, and ongoing training and workshops for parents; etc.

Adoption competent education and mental health assistance services for adoptive families – Those providing education and therapeutic services have the basic knowledge and skills to effectively work with adoptive families and to empower adoptive parents and families to provide

the environment necessary for ameliorating the effects of trauma (e.g., build relationships, improve relationships, develop nurturing and attachment, etc.); campaigns to recruit professionals to seek adoption competency; etc.

Case management services for adoptive parents and children – An intake process for families to return for needed services; designated case manager to respond to adopted children and families post-legal finalization; system to notify families of continued training, adoption workshops, and support group meetings, and resource guide that includes adoption-support information and service providers; etc.

The frequency of provision of these programs is based on the adoptive families' needs. It is difficult to ascertain a specific timeframe as these programs are developed on an 'as needed' basis. Data related to families and children served was only collected through the Post Adoption Specialist program.

IMPACT OF PROGRAMS

Of the hundreds of adoptive families over the years, many have spent considerable time improving the mental health and physical abilities of their adoptive children. Last year, there has been an influx of calls from adoptive families requesting assistance for local services, increased maintenance adoption subsidies, respite care, and other related post adoption services.

The realization that many adoptive families need a single point of access to these services has led the community based care programs to coordinate services, referrals and information requested by adoptive families post finalization. Circuit 7 found that the PAS position has made a significant impact by linking families to the appropriate programs listed above. The PAS will continue to track calls received from adoptive families and types of services requested. This will assist in determining the current local needs of adoptive families within the community.

SOURCE OF FUNDING

The primary source of funding for both Adoption Promotion and Adoption Support Services is predominately received through Federal and State funding such as: Title XIX Medicaid Administration, State of Florida General Revenue Funds and Medwaiver, IV-E Maintenance Adoption Subsidy, Promoting Safe and Stable Families (PSSF) IV-B-2, and Adoption Exchange Association. Most of these services are dependent on the general appropriations through the State of Florida. The agencies also receive funding through charitable contributions from individuals and local businesses within the communities. The private adoption agency, Embrace By Grace is funded by the consumer.

COST EFFECTIVENESS

For both Adoption Promotion and Adoption Support Services, it is imperative that the foster children we serve will obtain and maintain permanency. The Adoption Promotion programs are focused on finding a 'forever family' for those foster children who are available for adoption but are not placed in an identified home. The Adoption Support program is designed to concentrate on maintaining the existing adoptive family unit so that the child will not return to the dependency system.

In 2006, the Legislature appropriated additional funds for family foster care with an increase of \$60 a month. The new rates for traditional foster care are allotted based on the child's age and level of care. At a minimum, a child, 0-5 years old, placed in a traditional foster family home, will receive \$429 a month. At a maximum for traditional foster care, a teenager, 13 years and older, would receive \$515 a month. Medical foster care board rates increased to \$504 per month. For those children and teenagers who need higher levels of care based on their physical, developmental and mental health needs, the cost will exceed the highest traditional foster board rate. For example, the cost of care for a child placed in a dual diagnosed residential treatment center, the agency could pay up to \$363 a day or \$10, 890 a month.

According to 409.166(4)(b) F.S., Children within the child welfare system; adoption assistance program, states, “The department shall provide adoption assistance to the adoptive parents, subject to specific appropriation, in the amount of \$5,000 annually, paid on a monthly basis, for the support and maintenance of a child until the 18th birthday of such child or in an amount other than \$5,000 annually as determined by the adoptive parents and the department and memorialized in a written agreement between the adoptive parents and the department”. On the average, a negotiation between the agencies and adoptive parents for adoption subsidy would be based on 80% of the traditional foster board rate and up to \$5000 per year or \$417 a month. This amount, at its highest, still does not exceed the amount of money that it costs to care for a child in the dependency system.

Based on the information above, a child who remains or returns to foster care will exceed the cost of a child who is adopted. The range of services in both adoption programs, promotion and support, is more cost-effective compared to a child remaining or returning to foster care.

IV. PLAN PRIORITIES

As population count shows on page 1, there is an extreme volatility when there is a percentage for small populations. We must have some caution with the indicators. We must also take into account the number of adoption finalizations per county and number of providers serving each county.

A review of the data as a percent of the total was completed for each county. A comparison of the four counties in Circuit 7 did not reveal a significant difference occurring in any individual county. The team analyzed the data and found that there was only one need which could be distinguished per counties, Priority 2. Volusia County has already established support groups on the Westside and Eastside of the county. The other two needs, Priority 1 and 3 are congruent with each county.

VI. MONITORING AND EVALUATION

VI.A. MONITORING PLAN IMPLEMENTATION

The partners, who are tasked with the implementation efforts, will complete their sections of the monitoring report template. Their progress will be shared with the entire planning team on a routine basis. Such reporting will occur in the months of October, January, April and July each year, well in advance of the reports due to the Executive Office of the Governor. This routine exchange of information will serve to guide decisions about process implementation and performance. The information will then be rolled up into the monitoring reports to be submitted to the Executive Office of the Governor.

VI. B ANNUAL PROGRESS REPORTING

In January and July of each year, the Prevention Subcommittee team members and implementing partners will talk through the outline for the annual progress report. At these scheduled times, changes in direction, new initiatives, barriers to success and program outcomes will be discussed. Suggested changes to the plan will then be shared with the entire Prevention Team for their input, assistance and sanction. The final results of these discussions will be included in the annual report to the Executive Office of the Governor.

VII. BARRIERS

A description of barriers to the accomplishment of a comprehensive approach to the support of adoptive families. §39.001(8)(b)6.i

1. The medical/dental providers do not have an increase in payment for services through Medicaid. Thus, there are limited providers within the community who accept this form of insurance. Those who do accept Medicaid are overcapacity and must turn down new Medicaid clients.
2. The attorneys utilized for this service charge the amount Department of Children and Families is allowed to reimburse totaling \$1000 for each child.
3. Children who are diagnosed with a disability defined by the Agency for Persons with Disability (APD) after the adoption is final are placed on a waiting list for Med Waiver with other children. However, only those children currently in out-of-home care are given priority if APD opens enrollment prior to finalization.
4. The Adoption Support groups are only held in Volusia County. Need to expand locations to services all of Circuit 7.
5. There is no affordable respite care designated for adopted children. Most adoptive parents are unable to pay the cost for group homes and/or residential treatment. The demand is high and has created a strain, both financially and number of beds available, to meet the needs of these children through the Substance Abuse and Mental Health (SAMH) office. Thus, children are being removed from the family by the request of the parents and placed back into the dependency system.

VIII. RECOMMENDATIONS

Recommendations for changes that can be accomplished only at the state program level or by legislative action. §39.001(8)(b)6.j

1. Recommend the Florida Administrative Code 65C-16 re-drafted to elaborate on the specific types of services to meet the requirements related to educational and mental health.
2. The medical/dental providers do not have an increase in payment for services through Medicaid. Thus, there are limited providers within the community who accept this form of insurance. Those who do accept Medicaid are overcapacity and must turn down new Medicaid clients. Recommend the legislature increase Medicaid fees for medical and dental providers thus increasing the capacity for Medicaid eligible children.
3. Children who are diagnosed with a disability defined by the Agency for Persons with Disability (APD) after the adoption is final are placed on a waiting list for Med Waiver with other children. However, only those children currently in out-of-home care are given priority if APD opens enrollment. Recommend the legislature change the rules governing APD enrollment to give priority to post adopted children as well.
4. There is no affordable respite care designated for adopted children. Most adoptive parents are unable to pay the cost for group homes and/or residential treatment. The demand is high and has created a strain, both financially and number of beds available, to meet the needs of these children through the Substance Abuse and Mental Health (SAMH) office. Thus, children are being removed from the family by the request of the parents and placed back into the dependency system. Recommend the legislature support funding residential treatment for adopted children through Medicaid and short term residential treatment should be more widely available to adopted children in crisis.

As mentioned earlier, the vast majority of exposures reported to poison centers can be safely and effectively managed over the phone. For families who utilize the educational information provided by the Poison Center to prevent poisonings at home, the potential savings for a hospital admission related to a poisoning averages \$13,000, according to a 2007 report from the Florida Office of Injury Prevention. For patients who do require hospitalization for a poison exposure, there is recent data that indicates that even these patients who engaged the poison center in their care had shorter hospitalizations than those who did not call.
