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II. Process used to develop the plan and plan update

Facilitators were established for each team, which met at regular intervals and developed action plans for their area, i.e., Adoption Promotion, Child Abuse Prevention, etc. At Community Alliance Team meetings, team facilitators provided a status report and received feedback to incorporate into the report for their area of responsibility. Teams met regularly to develop, review, revise, and finalize the plans.

The individual teams met as needed. Each member of the teams was assigned an area of responsibility and providing feedback and offering suggestions.

Data was gathered from in-house sources information specific to the circuit and from the internet for information when local information was not available. Data from the "Sweat Monkey" survey was used to develop information about services currently offered within the Circuit.


A stakeholder meeting was held to review the status of the plan and seek input. Suggestions were incorporated into the plan.

The final plan was compiled and an overview of the plan submitted to the Community Alliance Committee for comments. The revised plan was then submitted to the Circuit Administrator for review and approval. Upon approval by the Circuit Administrator the report was submitted to the Executive Office of the Governor.

PART 2 – PLAN FOR THE PREVENTION OF ABUSE, ABANDONMENT, AND NEGLECT OF CHILDREN

I. STATUS OF CHILD MALTREATMENT

Status of child maltreatment (including the documentation of the magnitude of the problems of child abuse, including sexual abuse, physical abuse, and emotional abuse, as well as child abuse, abandonment, and neglect in the geographical area) §39.001(8)(b)6.a



Child Abuse and Neglect occurs in all income ranges from below poverty to wealthy. The occurrence of Child Abuse and Neglect is also found in all races, including White, Hispanic, Pacific Islander, Asian, American Indian and Black.


A large American Indian population resides in Santa Rosa and Okaloosa Counties and a large pacific islander population resides in Escambia. A local faith-based social service organization has applied through the federal government to assist with refugees relocating from Haiti, the impact of which is not known at this time.

Okaloosa County will see an additional 4,500 plus families moving to the area in 2010/2011 due to a Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC) exercise. This will also have a minor impact on the population in Santa Rosa and Walton Counties.


The Haas Center at the University of West Florida estimates the population of preschool children will increase almost 5,000 for the tri-county area (Okaloosa, Santa Rosa, and Walton) and the elementary school population will increase by nearly 9,000. Data is not available for Escambia County.

Education levels are connected to the level of poverty. Poverty places additional stressors on families, which can lead to Child Abuse and Neglect. South Walton County is a more affluent area, as opposed to North Walton. Protective factors can serve as a framework for supporting stressed families.


The level of education in Circuit One is comparable to that of the State, both high school graduates and those with Bachelor's degree or higher. However, almost 8% fewer individuals graduate from high school and 6% fewer graduate from college in Walton County than the rest of the Circuit.




Santa Rosa, Okaloosa, and Walton Counties have fewer individuals living in poverty than the State average. However, Escambia has almost 3% more individuals living in poverty as compared to the rest of the State, the second highest poverty rate for metropolitan areas in the State. Home ownership compares favorably to the rest of the state for Escambia and Okaloosa counties. Santa Rosa and Walton Counties homeownership rate significantly exceeds that of the State average.



Children 5 years old and under are at a higher risk for abuse and neglect. These children are often less visible in the community as they are not school age.



There is a larger population under 5 year olds in Circuit One. Okaloosa County has a larger population under 5 than the rest of the Circuit and is 15% larger than that of the State. Santa Rosa and Walton Counties have a significantly smaller population of children under 5 than the rest of the Circuit and State.



Abuse is significantly higher for pre-school children aged zero to five. The next highest group abused is those in elementary school. Abuse significantly decreases for those in middle and high school. Okaloosa County has the highest rate of abuse for age 0 to 5 but significantly reduces in elementary school aged children. This clearly identifies the population that needs to be targeted for child abuse and neglect prevention efforts as those aged 0 to 12.




Child abuse rates increased in three of four counties in Circuit1. However, child abuse rates in Santa Rosa County dropped over 5%.


Child abuse is more prevalent in white children. Gender does not seem to be a significant factor. Children under age 5 and age 9 to 17 are at higher risk of abuse.



Regardless of age, substance misuse is the most prevalent maltreatment in Circuit 1, followed by threatened harm, inadequate supervision, and family violence threatens child.



Physical injury increases as a percentage as children enter elementary school and continues to increase through high school. Middle school aged children experience a reduction in inadequate supervision, environmental hazards, and family violence threatens child. The children at highest risk are age 5 years and under, with the next age group being ages 6-12.



The most common types of services offered to families at disposition are family support services, case management, and child counseling. Day care services are often offered at disposition. While most of the services provided have been designed for groups, few services offered are tailored to meet the individual needs of families.

Circuit One was recently selected as one of three “Innovation Site” in the State and will begin a culture change from risk based to strength based child welfare practices. This shift focuses on the entire family rather than the individual risks identified during investigations. Child protective Investigators and Case Managers are being trained on the Strengthening Families approach, particularly the five protective factors. Training is also provided to service providers.

Perpetrators are predominantly white females over 26 years of age.

II. CONTINUA OF PRIMARY AND SECONDARY PREVENTION PROGRAMS

A continuum of programs necessary for a comprehensive approach to prevention of all types of child abuse, abandonment, and neglect (including brief descriptions of such programs and services) §39.001(8)(b)6.f

It is the intent of this planning effort to prevent child abuse, abandonment, and neglect before it ever occurs. Thus, for the purpose of this prevention plan, the continuum of programs (necessary for a comprehensive approach to prevention of all types of child abuse, abandonment, and neglect) focuses on the first two of the three levels of prevention and prevention-focused strategies:

II.A. CONTINUUM OF PRIMARY/UNIVERSAL PREVENTION PROGRAMS AND SERVICES *Accessible by the general public prior to the occurrence of child abuse and neglect*

Community Development – Community capacity building, community partnerships, etc.

Community Support for Families – Family resource centers, community events and fairs, etc.

Family Supportive Programs/Services – Voluntary home visiting; developmental screening; affordable, accessible quality childcare; before and after school programs; recreational activities; parent support groups; parent education classes; marriage and relationship counseling and support services; etc.

Information and Referral and Helplines – Access to information about community and social services available for families including early health and development services, etc.

Public Awareness and Education Campaigns – Highlighting risk/protective factors, child development, positive parenting, child safety, domestic violence and substance abuse prevention, bullying prevention, etc.

Workforce – Family-friendly workplace policies, livable wage policies, etc.

II.B. CONTINUUM OF SECONDARY/SELECTED PREVENTION PROGRAMS AND SERVICES *Targeted to families with multiple risk factors prior to the occurrence of child Abuse and Neglect*

Adult Education – High School Diploma, GED, job training, ESL classes, mentoring for high risk youth, etc.

Community Development – Community building, community partnerships, etc.

Community Support for Families – Food banks, clothing banks, housing assistance, transportation, emergency assistance, food stamps, quality childcare, etc.

Concrete Services – Referrals for (or provision of) clothing, food, utility payments, housing assistance, transportation, emergency assistance, respite care, etc.

Family Supportive Programs/Services – Voluntary home visiting (e.g., for families that meet Healthy Families Florida and Healthy Start criteria), parent education classes, teen parenting services, parent self-help support groups, domestic violence supports, substance abuse and mental health services, respite care (including families with disabilities), counseling for adults and children, developmental assessments, etc.

Workforce – Family-friendly workplace policies and livable wage policies, etc.

II.C. FLORIDA'S ECOLOGICAL FRAMEWORK


Florida's ecological framework serves to organize the potential influence and impact of prevention strategies and is based on the following assumptions:

- Children and families exist as part of an ecological system. This means that prevention strategies must target interventions at multiple levels: the individual, the relationship, the community, and society.
- Primary responsibility for the development and well-being of children lies within the family, and all segments of society must support families as they raise their children.
- Assuring the well-being of all families is the cornerstone of a healthy society and requires universal access to support programs and services.

It comprises four levels of influence:


1. **Individual level:** At this level are **parent and child characteristics** – emotional and psychological characteristics, temperament, behavior, problem-solving skills, health conditions, and beliefs – that can affect the rearing of children. Interventions at this level are often designed to affect an individual's social skills, cognitive skills, behavior and immediate circumstances.
2. **Relationship level: Interpersonal relationships** with peers, intimate partners, and family members shape an individual's behavior and range of experiences. This level contains factors such as family size, cohesion, communication, support, conflict, and stability that directly affect the child and influence the way in which adults care for children and each other. Interventions at this level are often designed to improve a person's ability to engage in positive and constructive relationships, especially within the immediate family.
3. **Community level:** Families operate within **neighborhoods and communities**. Factors that characterize this level include availability of supports (governmental and community), stability, violence, poverty, disorganization, and isolation; all affect the ability of families and communities to nurture their children. Interventions at the community level are typically designed to impact the climate, systems and policies in a given (usually geographic) setting.

4. **Societal level:** The **larger culture** in which families operate and children are raised plays a significant role in how families care for their young. Religious or cultural belief systems, values such as self-reliance and family privacy, and the cultural acceptance of media violence and corporal punishment of children affect the way in which parents raise their children and the ways in which communities support families. Interventions at the societal level typically involve collaborations of multiple partners to change laws and policies as well as to determine and influence societal norms and harmful cultural belief systems.

Circuit Goal 1

Children and teenagers are free from abuse, abandonment, and neglect and have safe, loving and permanent homes as measured by a reduction in the circuit-level child abuse rate from the fiscal year 2008-09 of 13.89 to a rate of 12.00 per 1,000 children by 30 June 2015.

Escambia County Goal 1.1

Children and teenagers are free from abuse, abandonment, and neglect and have safe, loving and permanent homes as measured by a reduction in the county-level child abuse rate from the fiscal year 2008-09 of 13.92 to a rate of 10.00 per 1,000 children by 30 June 2015.

Santa Rosa County Goal 1.2

Children and teenagers are free from abuse, abandonment, and neglect and have safe, loving and permanent homes as measured by a reduction in the county-level child abuse rate from the fiscal year 2008-09 of 13.78 to a rate of 10.00 per 1,000 children by 30 June 2015.

Okaloosa County Goal 1.3

Children and teenagers are free from abuse, abandonment, and neglect and have safe, loving and permanent homes as measured by a reduction in the county-level child abuse rate from the fiscal year 2008-09 of 20.53 to a rate of 15.00 per 1,000 children by 30 June 2015.

Walton County Goal 1.4

Children and teenagers are free from abuse, abandonment, and neglect and have safe, loving and permanent homes as measured by a reduction in the county-level child abuse rate from the fiscal year 2008-09 of 26.47 to a rate of 19.00 per 1,000 children by 30 June 2015.

VII. MONITORING AND EVALUATION

Plans for monitoring progress and for determining the results of the prevention efforts.

VII.A. MONITORING PLAN IMPLEMENTATION

Strengthening Family Teams have been established in each county. Team leaders were selected and are responsible for implementing the Strengthening Families Initiative in their respective county. Each of the team leaders was instrumental in completion of this plan and familiar with the requirements and will be responsible for completion of their section of the monitoring report. The report will be submitted to the Prevention Team.

The Prevention Team, made up of the Strengthening Families Team Leaders, a local AWI representative, a Department of Children and Families representative, and a community partner, will meet every other month to review progress and make recommendations.

The Prevention Team will update the progress for each of the action items listed in the plan and report results to the Executive Office of the Governor in accordance with the reporting requirements.

VII. B ANNUAL PROGRESS REPORTING

The Prevention Team will be responsible for completing the Annual Progress report for submission to the Executive Office of the Governor. This report will include data accumulated at the bi-monthly team meetings, monthly county-specific Strengthening Families Initiative meetings, stakeholder meetings, national data, etc. and will tell the story of progress toward the reduction of child abuse and neglect over the past year.

VIII. BARRIERS

Barriers to the implementation of the Strengthening Families Initiative include financial and cultural issues. Clearly there are no additional funds from the State available to implement this initiative. Additionally, funding opportunities are limited nationally as individuals and corporations have fewer resources to donate for philanthropic activities.

Organizations have developed a “culture” or way they do business and are reluctant to change. Many of the child care facilities believe they already demonstrate the five protective factors and do not see a need for change. This same culture exists in early education environments as well. We will need to work diligently to help early education and child care providers take that next step and look at the entire family in their service delivery system.

The final barrier is that there is a limited amount of human resources available to implement this plan. As financial resources are limited an extra burden has been placed on a smaller staff to accomplish perceived additional workloads. This is true not only in governmental agencies but not for profit organizations also.

IX. RECOMMENDATIONS

Florida statutes require that funds for Foster Care and Related Services are to be included in the Community Based Care (CBC) contract. As such, all funds associated with the prevention of child abuse and neglect are included in the CBC contract. Therefore, if additional funds are acquired through the

State for prevention efforts to implement this plan, they would be required to be included in the CBC contract and would not be available without the approval of the CBC lead agency. It would be helpful if these type funds of these funds remained in the Circuit and not have the requirement to include in the CBC Contract.

Federal Data Measures Analysis

Circuit 1 consists of four counties, Escambia, Okaloosa, Santa Rosa and Walton Counties. The Department's Community-Based Care Lead Agency, Lakeview Center Inc., FamiliesFirst Network (FFN) provides all foster care and related services for the Circuit. FFN does not subcontract any case management services.

Two special needs adoption units provide adoption and related services across the Circuit. One unit provides adoption and related services for Escambia County and is comprised of a Team Supervisor, 7 Family Services Counselors and a unit secretary. The second unit provides adoption and related services for Okaloosa, Santa Rosa and Walton Counties and is comprised of one Team Supervisor, 7 Family Services Counselor, 2 of whom are located in Santa Rosa County, 1 Family Support Worker and a unit secretary.

Adoption finalizations in Circuit 1 have increased by 70% from Fiscal Year 2007-2008, reporting 172 adoptions, to Fiscal Year 2008-2009, reporting 242 adoptions.

Circuit-wide, of the children adopted during the period July 2008 through June 2009, 50.4% were adopted within 24 months of entering out of home care. 46.01% were adopted within 24 months in Escambia County; 46.5% were adopted within 24 months in Okaloosa County, 66.67% were adopted within 24 months in Santa Rosa County, and no children were adopted in Walton County within 24 months. FFN is exceeding the Fiscal Year 2009-10 contract permanence measure goal of 44.6% of adoptions will be finalized within 24 months of entering out of home care.

For all children adopted whose adoptions were finalized during Fiscal Year 2008-2009 the Median length of stay for children in Escambia County was 24.4 months, in Okaloosa County was 24.6 months, in Santa Rosa County was 21.7 months and in Walton County 27.4 months. For all children adopted by relatives during Fiscal Year 2008-2009 the median length of stay for children was 25.4 months. For all children adopted by foster parents during Fiscal Year 2008-2009 the median length of stay for children was 25.5 months. For all children adopted by non-relatives during Fiscal Year 2008-2009 the median length of stay for children was 28.4 months. For all children adopted by recruited parents during Fiscal Year 2008-2009 the median length of stay for children was 26.5 months. The percentage of finalizations in Fiscal Year 2008-2009 for children in out of home care for 17+ months was 45.5%. The percent of children in foster care 17+ months who became legally free for adoption within six months in Fiscal Year 2008-2009 was 30.14%.

The number of children with a goal of APPLA as of May 9, 2009 Circuit wide is 169. Break down by county: 86 Escambia, 33 Okaloosa, 47 Santa Rosa and 3 Walton.

Other Data Measures – Analysis

Per data reported by DCF, in Circuit 1 on June 30, 2009

- 422 children were in out of home care for more than 12 months
- 140 children are available for adoption as of May 16, 2010 Circuit wide
- 40% of the children available for adoption are of a minority race
- 63 children are available for adoption as of May 16, 2010 in Escambia County
- 70 children are available for adoption as of May 16, 2010 Okaloosa County

- 0 children are available for adoption as of May 16, 2010 Santa Rosa County
- 2 children are available for adoption as of May 16, 2010 Walton County

Of the 140 children legally free for adoption in Circuit 1

- 66 have been legally free for adoption less than 12 months
- 38 have been legally free for adoption for 12 months
- 18 have been legally free for 24 months
- 7 have been legally free for 36 months
- 5 have been legally free for 48 months or longer
- 6 legally free for adoption data blank in FSFN

In Fiscal Year 2008-2009, 172 children were adopted in Circuit 1. Of the children adopted 43% were adopted by relatives, 30% were adopted by foster parents, 12% were adopted by non-relatives who provided care during the out of home period, and 14% were recruited adopted parents.

The average length of time between becoming legally free for adoption and finalization for children in matched adoptive placements (child is being adopted by current caregiver) rights during Fiscal Year 2008-2009 was 14 months.


The median length of time between becoming legally free for adoption and finalization for children in matched adoptive placements at the time of termination of parental rights during Fiscal Year 2008-2009 was 7 months.

Currently twenty-one children in out of home care available for adoption need child-specific adoption promotion efforts. All other children who are available for adoption are being adopted by the caregiver with whom the child is currently placed.

Currently two sibling groups available for adoption need child-specific adoption Promotion. All other sibling groups who are available for adoption are being adopted by the caregiver they are currently placed with.

As of May 23, 2010, 135 children are available for adoption. Sixty-six children are from Escambia County, 65 are from Okaloosa County, 2 are from Santa Rosa County and 2 are from Walton County. Forty-eight percent (65) are in matched placements. They are being adopted by their current caregiver.

I. CONTINUUM OF ADOPTION PROMOTION PROGRAMS

Adoption awareness efforts – Web-based, television, newspaper, magazine and radio public service announcements that provide a backdrop for general community awareness about the children in foster care who need adoptive families. The *Explore Adoption* campaign is pre-packaged and ready to be customized and used.

Targeted recruitment efforts – Focusing on specific groups of children and teens needing homes and identifying and targeting those communities most likely to adopt these children. Descriptions of common special needs of available children will lead to target populations that should be recruited; community and faith-based initiatives; incentive programs for foster and adoptive families to recruit others from their communities; advertisements, posters or flyers at places where foster and adoptive parents typically shop or visit; Web sites such as *Explore Adoption*; etc. The *Explore Adoption* campaign is pre-packaged and ready to be used.

Child-specific recruitment efforts – Locating and matching an identified waiting child with an approved adoptive family; media or materials describing and recruiting parents for an individual child; statewide and national adoption Web sites (e.g., *Explore Adoption*, Adoption Information Center, etc.); statewide and local heart galleries; radio, newspaper or television features; “passports” or brochures featuring the child’s strengths and needs; etc.

Orientation for prospective adoptive parents – Orientation meetings are held monthly for staff to explain the adoption process and requirements for becoming an adoptive family and they follow-up by sending literature and guides to prospective adoptive parents.

Assistance (navigating the system) for prospective adoptive parents – Consistent contact with prospective families, helpdesk for prospective families, guidebooks, brochures or paperwork that explains the process and steps that must be completed to become an approved adoptive parent, etc. *Explore Adoption* Web site has a FAQ page that would assist with this.

Pre-adoption training for prospective parents – Adoptive parent training (e.g., MAPP) and family self-assessment to determine if adoption is a feasible plan for prospective adoptive family, adoption specific training after completion of the MAPP class, etc.

Pre-adoption information for “waiting” parents (i.e., family approved for adoption) – Referrals to local adoptive parent support groups; consultation, brochures or paperwork explaining the process and steps that must be completed once a child is identified as a possible match for approved adoptive families; adoption-specific training after receiving approval to adopt; etc.

Placement case management for “pre-adoptive” parents – Match staffing, placement supervision, child history disclosure, anticipated child-specific services and training needs, etc.

III. PROGRAMS CURRENTLY PROMOTING ADOPTION

- **Name of the program:** Lakeview Center Inc., FamiliesFirst Network (FFN), facilitate special needs adoption services for children in the child welfare system who become legally free for adoption. The adoption program is comprised of an Adoption Program Specialist, an Adoption Home Finder, one unit that provides services to children and families in Escambia County, and a second unit that serves Okaloosa, Santa Rosa, and Walton Counties. The Escambia unit consists of a unit supervisor, seven Family Services Counselors, one Family Support Worker and one administrative assistant. The Santa Rosa/Okaloosa/Walton unit includes one unit supervisor, seven Family Services Counselors, one Family Support Worker and one administrative assistant. Lakeview Center Inc., FamiliesFirst Network's Adoption Program is the only entity providing special needs adoption services for children within the child welfare system in Circuit 1. Two Child Placing Agencies, Children's Home Society and Catholic Charities occasionally facilitate a private adoption of a child who meets the definition of special needs as describe in Florida Statute 409.166 (2)(a). In the event the adoptive parents need financial assistance to support the adoption, the family is referred by the Child Placing Agencies to Lakeview Center Inc., FamiliesFirst Network and the Adoption Specialist processes the requests for Maintenance Adoption Subsidy.
- **Target audience for the program:** Relatives, non-relatives, foster parents who care for the children during the child welfare case, and recruited adoptive parents.
- **Counties served by the program:** Escambia, Okaloosa, Santa Rosa and Walton Counties
- **Frequency of provision:** On going social services are provided to all children who are legally available for adoption through the child welfare system. Lakeview Center Inc., FamiliesFirst Network, (FFN) conducts on going adoption promotion circuit wide for prospective adoptive families for specific children available for adoption through presentations to churches, community organizations, and by billboards, Public Service Announcements, television commercials, newspapers and other available periodicals. The Florida Adoption Exchange and other national adoption exchanges are also utilized.
- **Number of families reached:** Lakeview Center Inc., FamiliesFirst Network (FFN) responded to more than 400 individuals who responded to adoption promotion efforts.
- **Most recent impact data (with date of collection):** As of June 30, 2009, 242 children from Circuit 1 were adopted during Fiscal Year 2008-2009. More than 1000 children have been adopted since Circuit 1 transitioned to Community-Based Care in 2002. Lakeview Center Inc., FamiliesFirst Network, (FFN) has exceeded the adoption performance target each of the last six years and are well on their way to exceed the 2009-2010 goal of 159 finalizations. Three adoptions dissolved during FY 2008-2009 due to the mental health issues. Lakeview Center Inc., FamiliesFirst Network contracts with Children's Home Society for the Adoption Support Team to provide post adoption services. The contract includes the completion of 40 home studies on pre-adoptive families; maintenance of an up to date adoptive resource directory available on line or hard copy which includes information on Medicaid providers, mental health services, and financial resources; post adoption follow-up contacts with families at 90 and 180 days from finalization which includes a satisfaction survey; and the availability of post adoption social services. During Fiscal Year 2008-2009 Children's Home Society Adoption Support Team serviced 539 adoptive families. Approximately 50% of adoptive families seeking assistance from Children's Home Society Adoption Support Team request help managing behavior and counseling support.
- **Most recent cost-effectiveness data (with date of determination):** Significant costs saving are seen by the taxpayers of Florida when children leave the paid out of home care system and join forever families. Based on the monthly foster care board rate for Fiscal Year 2008-2009 for all children adopted from the child welfare system in Circuit 1 the costs saving exceeded \$230,000.

- **Sources of funding:** Lakeview Center Inc., FamiliesFirst Network (FFN) is funded through the Community-Based Care contract funds which include federal and state funds.

V. PLAN OF ACTION FOR THE PROMOTION OF ADOPTION

Vision

Florida's highest priority is that children are raised in healthy, safe, stable, and nurturing families.

Mission

To serve as a blueprint that will be implemented to provide for the care, safety, and protection of all of Florida's children in an environment that fosters healthy social, emotional, intellectual, and physical development.

Outcome

All families and communities ensure that children are safe and nurtured and live in stable environments that promote well-being.

Goal 1

The percent of children adopted within 12 months of becoming legally free for adoption will increase from the fiscal year 2008-2009 rate of 82% to 100% by 30 June 2015.

Goal 2

The percent of children legally free for adoption who have been waiting for adoption since the date of termination of parental rights (TPR) for more than 12 months will be reduced from the June 2009 rate of 17% to 0% by 30 June 2015.

Strategy 1

By 30 June 2015, Circuit 1 will reduce the number of children who do not have an identified adoptive placement at the time of termination of parental rights to no more than 20% by March 2015.

VI. MONITORING AND EVALUATION

VI.A. MONITORING PLAN IMPLEMENTATION

Each quarter the Circuit 1 adoption promotion and support planning team will meet and talk through the outline for the annual progress report. The benefits of sharing this information on a regularly scheduled basis, not only include having the annual report compiled throughout the year, but also inform, guide and give cause for truly informed decision-making about continued and future direction and results. The circuit adoption promotion and support planning team will monitor the ongoing progress of the implementation of the plan by reviewing monthly management reports through Florida's Safe Family Network (FSN). The monthly reports will include:

- Number of adoptions finalized per month
- Number of children available for adoption termination of parental rights completed

Lakeview Center Inc., FamiliesFirst Network Adoption Specialist maintains monthly adoption data which includes:

- All children available for adoption
- Type of placement (matched or needs recruitment)
- Status of completion of adoption home study
- Status of completion of the child study
- Status of completion of the subsidy file
- Average and Median time from removal to finalization
- Average and Median time from termination of parental rights to finalization

Lakeview Center Inc., FamiliesFirst Network Adoption Home Finder Specialist maintains monthly child specific recruitment data which include:

- Child Specific Recruitment activities for each child who does not have an identified adoptive placement
- The date of the identified adoptive placement
- The date the adoptive placement is made
- The date the adoption finalizes

The Adoption Specialists meet with the Adoption Supervisors and Counselors on a quarterly basis to facilitate to staff the status of all "matched and "unmatched" placements and maintains data which includes:

- Date adoptive home study is due for all "matched" placements
- Reason for delay in making an adoptive placement for all "matched" placements
- Child specific issues causing delay in recruiting an adoptive home

VI. B ANNUAL PROGRESS REPORTING

The circuit adoption promotion and support planning team chair will combine the above data each month and will roll up the results for the semi-annual monitoring report.

VII. BARRIERS

Barriers to the accomplishment of a comprehensive approach to the promotion of adoption in Circuit 1 include:

- The reluctance of older children to participate in recruitment activities
- Caseload size and time constraints to completing necessary paperwork (home studies, child studies and compiling subsidy file documents)
- Matched placement caregivers who do not meet the administrative rule standards to be approved to adopt
- Matched placement caregivers who do not complete required paperwork timely.

VIII. RECOMMENDATIONS

- College tuition waiver eligibility prior to May 5, 1997 finalization date.
- Maintenance Adoption Subsidy through high school graduation regardless of age.
- Medicaid eligibility through high school and college.

Three adoptions dissolved during Fiscal Year 2008-2009 due to the children's mental health issues. All three of the children are receiving residential mental health treatment.

Adoption support group meeting post cards announcing the monthly adoption support group meetings are mails out to over 400 adoptive families and pre-adoptive families waiting to adopt in Escambia and Santa Rosa Counties. Another 400 post cards are mailed out to adoptive families and pre-adoptive families waiting to adopt in Okaloosa and Walton Counties. Each meeting includes a speaker on topics of interest to adoptive families or a family oriented activity. Speakers have included a mental health professional who spoke on attachment issues, sexual abuse and sexual safety, a fire fighter who spoke on fire safety, a " juggler" who spoke about juggling and communication, and a state trooper who spoke about traffic laws. Group activities have included Christmas parties, swimming parties, a bowling party, and pumpkin carving fun night. The Escambia/ Santa Rosa Adoption support group, "Adopt R Us" has been meeting for over three years and has good attendance. This group also co- sponsors the annual adoption picnic with FFN adoption staff. The Okaloosa /Walton adoption support group, "Kids By Choice," is not well attended. The group leaders are determined they will continue meeting, regardless of a lack

of attendees. The adoption support group meetings are held in a variety of locations in each county chosen by the adoptive families.

Community mental health centers provide individual and family counseling and other mental health case management services such as medication management; however Circuit 1 does not have any adoption competent mental health professionals at the present time. Adoption Competency Training has begun in Circuit 1, facilitated by Kathy Waters, Adoption Specialist for Family Safety Program Office. Seven Licensed Mental Health Counselors (LMHC) representing each of the four counties community mental health agencies are attending the train-the-trainer course. Once certified they will provide training to additional therapist in the home agencies.

A quarterly adoption news letter is sent to all adoptive families throughout the Circuit. Training opportunities provided by FFN or and other community organizations are highlighted. Adoptive parents who attend the monthly adoption support group arrange for training specific to needs identified by the group. Adoptive parents are also invited to training provided by the Foster Parent Association.

FFN contracts with Children's Home Society (CHS) to provide the Adoption Support Team Program. The Adoption Support Team provides information and referral services and post adoption case management to adoptive families who request post adoption services. The program consists of one supervisor (Kathleen Gilmore) , two adoption case managers and one family support worker. Contact Information is: Children's Home Society, (850) 266-2700.

III. PROGRAMS CURRENTLY SUPPORTING ADOPTIVE FAMILIES

Description of programs currently supporting adoptive families (including information on the impact, cost-effectiveness, and sources of funding) §39.001(8)(b)6.d

Name of the program: The Children's Home Society Adoption Support Team Program (AST) is a subcontracted provider of Lakeview Center Inc., FamiliesFirst Network. The program provides information, referral and post finalization adoption social services for families who adopt special needs children, (i.e. children from the child welfare system). The Adoption Support Team is the only program Circuit wide that specifically provides services to adoptive families who adopted children from the child welfare system.

Target audience for the program: Special needs adoptive families.

Counties served by the program: Escambia, Okaloosa, Santa Rosa and Walton Counties.

Frequency of provision: The Adoption Support Team (AST) is contracted to complete 40 home studies on pre-adoptive families. AST maintains an up-to-date adoption resource directory which is provided to all special needs adoptive families. The Adoption Support Team conducts pre-finalization contact with all special needs adoptive families within the Circuit to provide information about their services. They provide post adoption follow-up contacts with all special needs adoptive families within the Circuit at 90 and 180 days from finalization which includes satisfaction surveys. The Adoption Support Team provides post adoption social services. During Fiscal Year 2008-2009 the Adoption Support Team serviced 539 adoptive families. Approximately half of adoptive families seeking assistance from Children's Home Society Adoption Support Team request help managing behavior and counseling support.

Number of families, children served: The Adoption Support Team served 539 families during Fiscal Year 2008-2009.

Most recent impact data: Data is not available to accurately determine the cost effectiveness of the Adoption Support Team. Adoption dissolutions are not tracked by the Circuit. However, without the Adoption Support Team the community-based care adoption units would be required to provide information, referrals and case management for post adoptive families thus increasing their work loads.

Most recent cost-effectiveness data: The Adoption Support Team is funded Promoting Safe and Stable Families funds and other Community-Based Care funding for case management and training. For Fiscal Year 2009-2010 Promoting Safe and Stable Families funds of \$162,968 have been appropriated for adoption support.

Sources of funding: Funding for adoption support is allocated in the community-based care contract for maintenance adoption subsidy Title IV E, Temporary Assistance Needy Families, General Revenue, and Promoting Safe and Stable Families funds.
