Florida's Five Year Prevention and Permanency Plan State Fiscal Year 2013 – 2014 Progress

Highlights and Accomplishments

Families First is a prevention program located in child care centers in Lee and Hendry counties. A family support worker is collocated at the child care centers to provide services requested by the parents. The goal is to reduce violence by alleviating family stressors. In 2014 the program added a third family support worker to expand the program to two additional centers.

Diversion program through Boys Town to provide case management and crisis services to families at risk of abuse and neglect was added for all five counties.

The family centered services program in Lee and Charlotte counties, which provides services to families at risk of abuse and neglect has added a Certified Addictions Professional to work with clients with substance abuse issues.

In order to expand and strengthen pregnancy prevention services to teens, the Children's Network is currently partnering with the Wyman TOP program and is working in Southwest Florida communities to open up programs. The Children's Network is providing community education about the benefits of the program and developing additional sites. We are expanding to the local school systems as part of the educational curriculum. In Charlotte County, the program has expanded to the on-site school at a residential group home. The club locations are expanding as new partners come on board. We now have a presence in all five counties.

About half the children in out of home care are placed with relatives and non-relatives. The Children's Network has hired a consultant to expand services to these families in order to stabilize placements and keep these children out of the foster care system. The lead agency is continuing to modify the PRIDE curriculum for relative caregivers and implemented that training to meet local needs.

The Children's Network has received a grant from DCF to provide integrated services (IFS) to families in the child welfare system with substance abuse and/or mental health issues. Clients served by this program are in-home cases who work with a team of professionals from the child welfare and mental health/substance abuse systems.

The IFS program is specifically designed to provide a wrap-around substance abuse, mental health, or co-occurring in-home service intervention for at-risk families in both Lee or Charlotte counties. This pilot project has shown the significance of integrating substance abuse/mental health services with child welfare system of care. The program is a newly formed initiative, but is already showing efficacy for reducing the number of children entering out-of-home care by pairing clinicians and child welfare case management staff. By June, 44 children and 32 families had received services.

Relative Search-CNSWFL is committed to ensuring a robust and comprehensive effort is made to identify and place children with kin when at all possible. Our team which works from the onset of every out-of-home case in Lee county to pursue every possible kinship placement and to conduct an assessment if there is either the potential to place or facilitate contact between the children involved with our dependency system and their kin within our community.



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Faith-Based Licensing Agencies-Our foster care program ranks as one of the top performing agencies statewide with recruiting new foster families, this is in large part due to our strong relationship with our faith-based community. Our faith-based community partners serve as a point of support, awareness, and advocacy on behalf of foster families across Circuit 20. Our partners working within Circuit 20 are Florida Baptist Children's Home, Gulf Coast Jewish Family Community Services, and Lutheran Services of Florida. Due to these efforts our foster care program is integrated within our local community and has experienced a significant enhancement through these faith-based partners.

Redlands Migrant Christian Association (RCMA)-In an effort to meet the needs of all of the children served through our very diverse Circuit, CNSWFL has recently partnered with RCMA to expand our foster care program. An ever increasing number of Spanish speaking children have entered out-of-home care and we are working to increase our number of Spanish speaking foster families to support both linguistic and cultural connections for the children in our system. RCMA will be offering Spanish PRIDE training across Collier, Hendry, and Glades counties to assist us in addressing this issue. CNSWFL is committed to assessing our ever evolving community and taking the appropriate steps to develop the services structure to support children and families.

ABC visitation:

In the first years of life, young children are dependent on their parents not only for meeting their basic needs and safety, but also for help regulating their physiology, attention, behavior and emotions. When infants and young children experience caregiving failures through adverse conditions such as neglect, maltreatment, and exposure to violence, they are at risk for many problems, including challenges with self-regulation and disorganized attachment. Dr. Dozier and her lab have followed several populations of at-risk children, studying the effects of early adversity on development in early childhood.

Attachment and Bio-behavioral Catch-up (ABC), which is a 10-week intervention that specifically targets several key issues with parents of very young children. The intervention has been shown to be effective in improving young children's attachment status, biology (cortisol levels), executive functioning, and emotion regulation compared to a control intervention. The goal of ABC is to enhance parents' capacities for interacting with their children in nurturing, synchronous, and non-frightening ways.

The proposed research project is an extension of this work to an especially vulnerable population, young children (ages 6 months to 5 years) who have recently been placed in foster care. After foster care placement, birth parents are often limited to supervised visitation at an office or "visitation center". Foster parents, now the child's primary caregiver, are only sporadically present at these visits. Such visits can go poorly; children and parents are upset; there is little structure or preparation for the visit; parents have unrealistic expectations and children may feel anxiety in the absence of their caregiver, causing feelings of rejection by the birth parent. As a result parents often miss visits in the beginning of a placement period causing further distance between parent and child, distrust between foster and birth parent, and delays in reunification. This research will test an adaptation of ABC to be used as a method for improving visitation visits between children, foster parents, and birth parents.



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The goals of the proposed study are:

- 1) Strengthen the relationship between the foster parent and birth parent
- 2) Help the birth parent to have a successful visit, feel less rejected by their child, and so encourage repeated visitation
- 3) Increase foster and birth parent use of synchrony (also known as “following the lead”) and delight with her child

One Church, One Child: This program sponsored an event in Fort Myers in June 2014 to introduce the program and to raise awareness of the need for children to be adopted. Focus was on how the church could help with permanency for children and for the need for foster and adoptive parents.

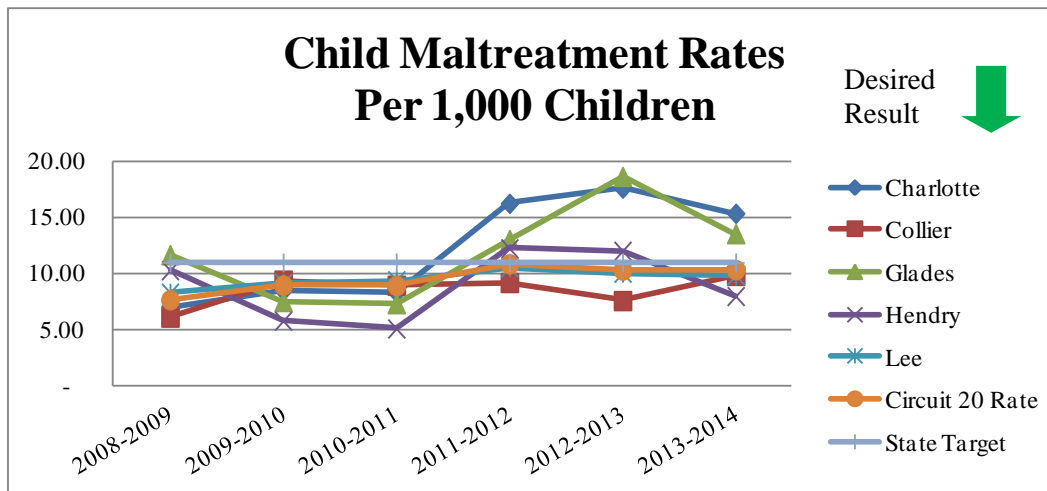

Circuit 20 will support local efforts to connect additional young people, from birth to age 20, to all five fundamental resources (Ongoing relationships with caring adults, safe places and structured activities during non-school hours, a healthy start for a healthy structure, marketable skills through effective education, and opportunities to serve).

Additional Activities

Abuse Counseling and Treatment and The Shelter for Abused Women and Children launched the Medical Responder program were the Shelter responds 24/7 to local emergency rooms if a victim is identified and willing to meet with an advocate.

Both shelters continue to work with community providers to include doctor's offices, to promote early detection of potential Domestic Violence and to share avenues for victims to receive support needed.

Interagency Collaboration

Child Maltreatment Prevention

Circuit 20, The Children's Network of Southwest Florida and additional community partners continue to raise awareness about the issues of child abuse and neglect through various outreach activities. In October 2013, the Children's Network sponsored its 8th annual Walk to Prevent Child Abuse which had nearly 500 walkers and local agencies participating. The walk raised about \$50,000.00 to support child abuse prevention activities in southwest Florida.

In Collier County, the Children's Advocacy Center took the lead to raise awareness. To kick off Child Abuse Prevention Month, the CAC participated in Lauren Book's "Walk in my Shoes" event. CAC staff, partnering agencies, and CAC supporters walked across Collier in order to bring awareness to child sexual abuse and to empower survivors of abuse. Following the event, CAC submitted a newspaper article to Naples Daily News, which discussed the importance of prevention and identification of child abuse. This was CAC's first year to participate in the event, but we plan to make it an annual activity.

In order to bring awareness to Child Abuse Prevention Month, the CAC initiated a proclamation in Collier County with the county commissioners, declaring April as Child Abuse Prevention Month.

During the month of April, our staff reached out to local schools to give presentations on personal safety to students. Education was provided at the Community School of Naples for children in kindergarten through fifth grade. The focus was to teach children how to keep themselves safe and to educate them about abuse.

Finally, CAC held the eighth annual Golf Classic at the Country Club of Naples. Participants included members of the Collier County Sheriff's Office, Department of Children and Families, and other local leaders of the

community. There were over 100 people in attendance. This event helped people in the community understand the programs CAC provides and to increase understanding of child abuse.

In conclusion, during the April campaign, the CAC has increased community awareness of child abuse in key areas of our community. The CAC Parenting Education Program staff is proud to have participated in this valuable and necessary campaign. The CAC expects that these endeavors in the areas of education, training, and development

Proposed Activities for 2014-2015

The 9th annual walk to prevent child abuse is already scheduled for October, 25, 2014.

Human Trafficking Activities

Summary of Human Trafficking Activities

The Circuit 20, Lee, Collier, Hendry, Glades and Charlotte Human Trafficking Task Force held local community events to raise awareness. Leaders of the Southwest Florida Community Foundation, along with community leaders from Lee, Charlotte, Collier, Glades and Hendry counties, traveled to a number of nonprofit agencies in the Southwest Florida region the week of November 4, 2013, to present and celebrate \$440,000 in funds during the inaugural visits. Fifteen agencies in the five-county area were the recipients of funds totaling \$439,812 in Community Impact Grants provided by the SWFLCF. The foundation administers more than 330

endowed funds that are created through the generosity of local donors today and those who plan for the future through the power of endowed funds. Turning the unemployed into entrepreneurs, improving conditions for homeless animals and protecting people from human traffickers are just a few of the ways the recipient nonprofits are helping to strengthen our region.

Proposed Human Trafficking Activities for 2014-2015

The Southwest Florida Regional Resource Center on Human Trafficking (the Center), established in 2014, operates through a joint partnership with The Women's Fund of Southwest Florida and Florida Gulf Coast University. The Center serves the Southwest Florida Human Trafficking Task Force which is led by the region's U.S. Attorney's Office located in Fort Myers, Florida. Through its involvement, the Center ensures that human trafficking is addressed in a coordinated manner throughout Southwest Florida.

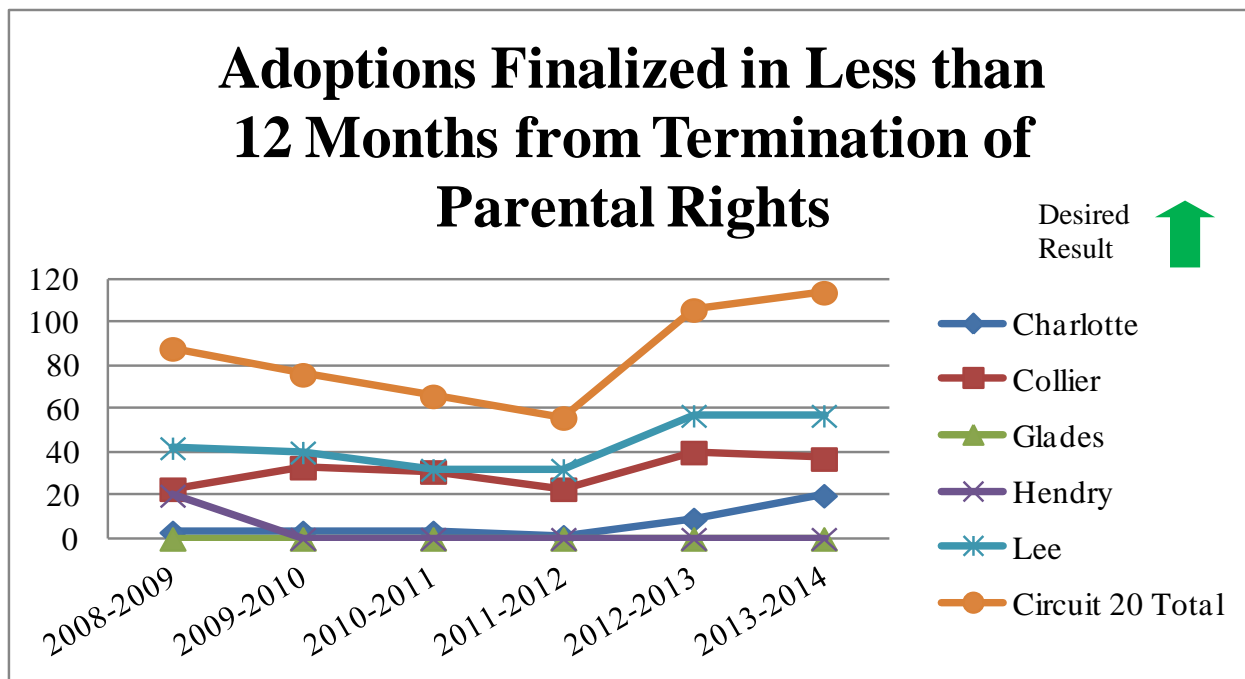

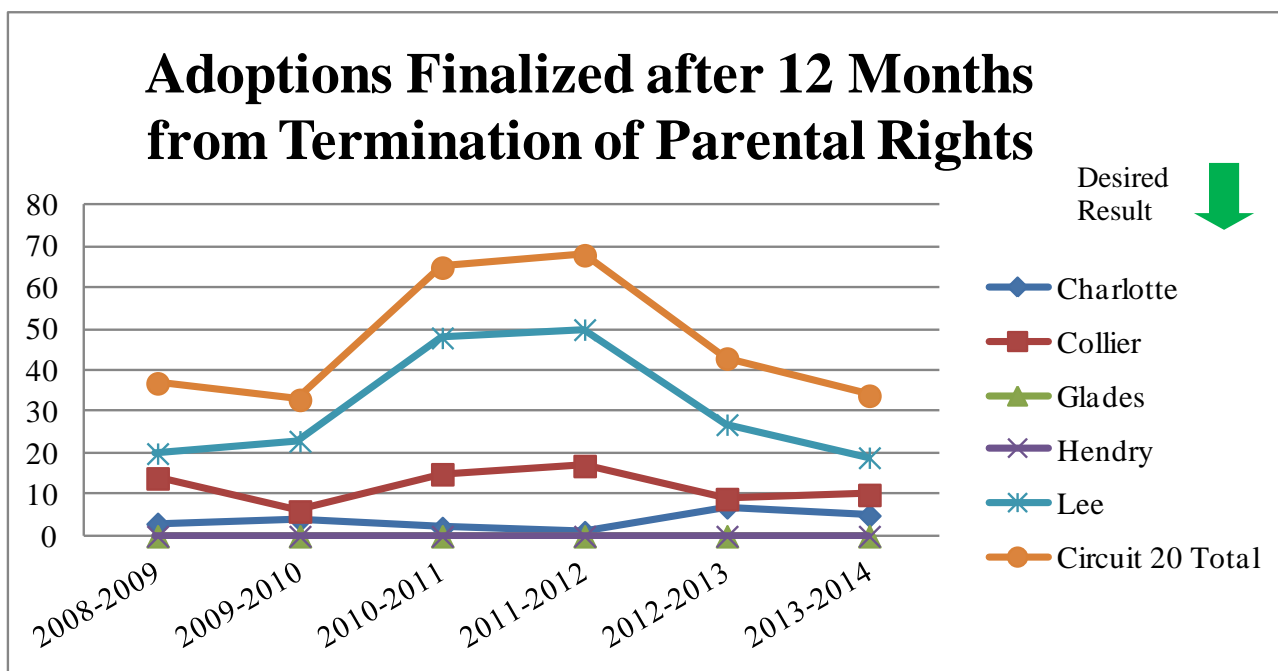

Ongoing	The Children’s Network is monitoring its providers to assure they meet the goals set for number of families. All the providers are using the PRIDE curriculum to train families. In addition, a post-adopt case manager is placed in each Case Management Organization to provide services and support to children in subsidized adoption. They can refer families to needed services and provide limited case management as needed.

Strategy 2: By June 30, 2015, Circuit 20 will Increase Post-Adoption Support Groups, which provide Adoptive families with opportunities to network amongst each other, as well as receive training and educational materials specific to the needs of children who have experienced abuse, neglect or abandonment.
