

Invitation to Join FOCUS

When families are hurting, they seek support from faith-based organizations. Faith-based organizations provide the food, clothing, and emergency financial assistance. They provide shelter and solace. They provide the healing for "broken people" who are suffering from addictions of any kind including drugs, and alcohol. They provide the encouragement and examples to let those most affected know that it can be overcome. Regardless of these interventions, faith-based leaders know these families and individuals need more than that "one-time" intervention. This one dosage is not enough to truly restore these struggling persons and individuals to make them "whole" again.

In 2007, a network of faith-based leaders and social service providers residing and serving the communities of mid-county Pinellas: Pinellas Park, Largo, Lealman, Seminole and the Ridgecrest communities had a vision to have a "one-stop" center that could provide comprehensive services for those challenged with unresolved trauma, unmet needs, and negative family histories. These factors contribute to lives without purpose and plagued with constant challenges for basic needs. In order to restore these individuals and families, a network of faith-based leaders and social service providers committed to returning these individuals and families to a state of resiliency and spiritual purpose. They adopted the following goals:

- To identify and create an awareness of services and social action ministries by connecting and collaborating with other faithbased organizations and social service providers
- 2. To share those services and replicate in other communities where the need arises with technical assistance and support.
- 3. To increase the visibility of your ministries by sharing your vision

These network goals have been embraced by a growing number of social service providers and faith-based organizations. FOCUS invites you to join us every third Thursday at 1:30 p.m. at the Juvenile Welfare Board, 14155 58th Street N, Clearwater, Florida, as we move forward for the realization of the above goals.

that is open and consistent to build trust among participants


BACKBONE SUPPORT

Faith Based Champions for Children Initiative


Faith Based Champions for Children is an initiative of Eckerd in partnership with One Church, One Child of FL, Heart Gallery of Pinellas & Pasco, Directions for Living, Lutheran Services Florida, Youth & Family Alternatives, Juvenile Welfare Board of Pinellas and Safe Families for Children. The initiative is designed to identify and partner with you in an effort to find foster and adoptive homes for all foster children in the Tampa Bay Area. Partner places of worship will be known as Faith Based Champions and will receive a tool-kit of resources to help in recruiting foster and adoptive families, as well as information on helping provide much-needed resources for foster children.

What is a Faith Based Champion?

Faith Based Champions are places of worship. that commit to helping children like Anthony find a foster or adoptive home, as well as providing much-needed resources to children like Anthony in foster care. When you sign up, your place of worship will receive a Heart Gallery portrait of a local foster child available for adoption, so you can share their story with your congregation and pray for that child. Your spiritual leader or designee will also receive a tool kit of resources to educate your congregation about the need for foster and adoptive families, and resources our children need. Each Faith Based Champion tool kit will include:

- ✓ Heart Gallery Portrait

 Heart Gallery portrait of a local foster child available for adoption, and child photo bio cards that includes the child's digital photo and bio to feature in bulletins, flyers, websites, newsletters, etc.
- ✓ Foster Parent Recruitment Materials— Plexiglas card holder filled with foster parent recruitment materials, so your members will know what it takes to become a foster parent
- ✓ Raising Hope Brochures Lists items needed to stock our Eckerd Raising Hope "Room of Hope" to meet the needs of infants, children and teens entering foster care and beyond.
- ✓ One Church One Child Materials Materials include a kiosk, photo album of children available for adoption, brochures, family referral form, and music CD
- ✓ Access to Speakers Various speakers from Eckerd are available to speak to your congregation about your featured child or about foster parenting or adoption in general



Eckerd is a national nonprofit youth and family service organization that has given much-needed second chances to 100,000+ children and families since 1968. Eckerd Community Alternative, a program of Eckerd, is the community-based care lead agency for child welfare services in Pasco and Pinellas counties and serves over 3,400 children each day in the local foster care system.

Trenia L. Cox, Facilitator, is the Senior Special Projects Coordinator with the Juvenile Welfare Board (JWB) which is a publicly funded, mission-driven organization that improves the lives of children and families through programs, partnerships and advocacy that ultimately benefit the whole community. She is currently responsible for faith-based and community engagement along with community capacity-building. Since 1996, she has served this organization and community in other capacities including Faith-based Coordinator, Manager of Community Planning, and as a Contract Manager. She is a former professor in Social and Behavioral Sciences at St. Petersburg Florida and was appointed in 2016 to the State of Florida's Faith-based and Community-based Advisory Council.



Brian Bostick is the Executive Director of Eckerd Community Alternatives Pasco and Pinellas Counties. Mr. Bostick brings a wealth of knowledge and experience to his position as Executive Director for Eckerd Community Alternatives | Pasco and Pinellas, one of the largest lead agency contracts in the state of Florida. Under Brian's leadership, a new record was set in 2013 when more than 300 children in the Pasco/Pinellas foster care system were adopted by forever families. Since the start of his career in child welfare during the early 90s, Mr. Bostick has held various supervisory positions within the Florida Department of Children and Families (DCF), other lead agencies and case management organizations. He currently oversees and collaborates with Case Management Organizations, Sheriff's Office Child Protective Investigations, State's Attorney's Office, Guardian Ad Litems and other

stakeholders to improve outcomes for children and families in the Tampa Bay area. He received his undergraduate degree from Florida A&M University in Tallahassee, FL. He is active in the local community by dedicating his time as a youth football coach and mentor since 1994.



Judith Warren is the Chief Operations Officer of the Juvenile Welfare Board with over 20 years of experience in human services – 10 in the private sector and 10 with the Florida Department of Children and Families. Ms. Warren brings a unique combination of operational and quality assurance leadership expertise to the position. Ms. Warren has achieved an impressive resume of awards, accolades and appointments for her outstanding performance, leadership, innovation and productivity. In 2010, DCF presented Ms. Warren with two prestigious awards – the Leadership Award during their annual Dependency Summit and the Davis Productivity Award for employee retention. Throughout her career, she has served on multiple state and area children's boards and councils; served on the Independent Living Services Redesign Committee as

appointed by the DCF Secretary; and is a certified COA peer reviewer. Ms. Warren received her B.A. in Education from the University of Kentucky, her Master's Degree in Public Administration from Troy University, and is a resident of Clearwater where she enjoys cycling and spending time with her family.

Sheriff Bob Gualtieri has been the Pinellas County Sheriff since November 2011. Sheriff Gualtieri began his career with the Sheriff's Office over 30 years ago and has served in many different capacities, including the agency's General Counsel and the Chief Deputy (second in command). Sheriff Gualtieri is an active member of Florida and national organizations that effect law enforcement policy, including the Florida Sheriff's Association, National Sheriff's Association, Major County Sheriff's Association, Police Executive Research Forum, and the International Association of Chiefs of Police. Sheriff Gualtieri is active in the community serving on numerous boards, including the Boys & Girls Club of the Suncoast, Pinellas Homeless Leadership Board, Sheriff's Police Athletic League and the Pinellas Education



Steven Cleveland is the Director of the Florida Dream Center Adopt-a-Block program. In addition to sitting on the Board of the Florida Dream Center, he is a member of the Hillsborough County Parks and Recreation Executive Board of Directors. Previously, Mr. Cleveland sat on the Boards of Directors of Child Protection Education of America, Everyday Blessings, YES United of America, and is involved with several fraternal organizations including the Eagles, Moose and AMVETS. His personal mission is to act as an instrument of positive change in his family, his work and his community.



Alfred Lomas is a national and international speaker, gang abatement consultant, social entrepreneur and founder of Inner-City Visions & LA Gang Tours, a nonprofit organization dedicated to gang violence reduction and youth development strategies. Mr. Lomas is also currently working with a multi agency collaborative that specializes in hardcore gang intervention strategies. This involves formalized training, to certify former gang members and community partners who all are working to end gang violence in Los Angeles. He started as the Director of the mobile food truck program at the Los Angeles Dream Center, the program provides food to 50,000 people and distributes 200 tons of provisions every month across the Los Angeles metropolis, primarily for low-income families who live in inner city housing projects, at-risk neighborhoods, and high crime areas.


Family Oriented Concept Unifed to Serve

Since 1946, the Juvenile Welfare Board has devoted its resources to the healthy development of children and families in Pinellas County. Through the years, this commitment was largely demonstrated through the allocation of funding for program services. With a continued reduction in revenue since 2007, due to decreasing property values, the high foreclosure rate and property tax reform, JWB was driven to re-examine how it was doing business. One of the organizational changes was the decision to engage key community stakeholders to increase the positive collective impact on struggling families and children. This led to a campaign to engage the faith-based community, who has historically served as the first responders to children and families.

In 2011, through targeted outreach, the asset mapping of the faithbassed leadership of Pinellas County, one network was formed with a dedication to build healthier communities and restore the village through the spiritual principles of love, compassion, and forgiveness. This network consists of faith-based leaders and social service providers, primarily serving and focusing on the communities of Lealman, High Point, Pinellas Park, Largo, Seminole, with projected expansion to other communities throughout Pinellas County. The mission is to increase access to needed services in order to build the resiliency of individuals and families resulting in stronger and healthier communities.




