### Eliminating Barriers: A Collaborative Approach

Share training opportunities on key child-welfare issues such as effective child interviewing techniques, bonding, substance abuse, and domestic violence among the various child-welfare providers including Department of Health, Department of Children and Families, Guardian ad Litem, Child Protection Teams, and others.
- 2. Sharing data among the various agencies working with children and families. This will facilitate real-time information flow to ensure that the best decisions are being made based on the most comprehensive and current information available.
- 3. Flexible funding is essential so that services can be offered without a child coming into care.
- Guardian ad Litem remains committed to removing obstacles and working towards the integration of collaborative systems aimed at improving outcomes for children and families.

- Our goal and our mission is to provide quality legal and best interest representation for every child in our dependency system.
- For Fiscal Year 2012-2013, our goal is to increase the number of children represented by the Program from 20,710 to 23,793
- 3. Effective volunteer recruitment and management will continue to play a critical role in our ability to achieve our goals. In order to reach our goals for the upcoming Fiscal Year, we will need an additional 1.511 volunteers.
- Our strategic plan is based on a five year incremental strategy that will result in Guardian ad Litem Program representation for 100% of our State's dependent children.
