

Florida Children and Youth Cabinet Headline Indicator Update Access to Health Care

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Florida's Uninsured Children

- A U.S. Census study on health insurance coverage status and type of coverage by state for children under 18 reports that Florida had 576,000 uninsured children (14.2 %) in 2010, down from 712,000 (17.6 %) in 2008
- National average is about 10.2%
- Varying studies report Florida uninsured number as high as 19%


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- Florida KidCare is the state's low-cost, quality health insurance for children 0-18 years old

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Florida KidCare Enrollment & Eligibility



Florida KidCare Enrollment-Historical View


Total KidCare Enrollment

Successful Outreach Techniques

- A national study by the National Academy for State Health Policy reported the following findings as critical to the success of a program like Florida KidCare:
 - Keep enrollment and renewal procedures simple
 - Employ community based outreach which is key to increasing enrollment
 - Use technology to coordinate programs and reduce administrative burdens
 - Change agency culture to promote enrollment goals
 - Engage leaders who champion the goal of covering kids
 - Engage partners to help achieve coverage goals
 - Use marketing to promote enrollment in public programs



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Keep Enrollment and Renewal Procedures Simple

Implemented practices:

- Simplified paper application
- Developed on line application and renewal
- Electronically verify income and citizenship



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Community Based Outreach is Key to Increasing Enrollment

Implemented Practices:

- Community based organizations
 - Coalitions
 - Boots on the Ground
 - Matching grantees
- Health Plans
- Local and religious organizations
- Hospitals
- Health Agent Association
- Schools



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Technology Coordinates Programs and Reduces Administrative Burdens

Implemented Practices:

- Automated referral between Medicaid and CHIP
- Mailed outreach material to food stamp recipients
- Outbound personal calls to expiring applicants

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Use Marketing to Promote Enrollment in Public Programs

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Implemented Practices:

- Promotional materials
 - Create materials with KidCare Creative tool
 - Provide materials to community partners
- Act out for Health Contest
 - PSA, billboard and essay contest for students grades 4-12
 - Winning entries on television, in schools, on billboards



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Barriers to Enrollment Growth

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- Populations ineligible for state subsidy
 - Legal immigrants in first five years
 - State employee dependents
 - Families > 200% FPL
- Limited recurring outreach funds
- Lack of program awareness/trust
- Cultural/language barriers
- Difficulties navigating the system




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Barriers to Enrollment Growth

- KidCare State Fiscal Year (July 2010-June 2011)
 - Annual renewal
 - 38,000 CHIP children terminated for non compliance with renewal
 - 550,000 Medicaid children closed
- CHIP Fiscal Year (July 2010-June 2011)
 - Premium requirement
 - 81,000 disenrollments for non-payment
 - Transfer to Medicaid
 - 80,000 children transferred to Medicaid



Recommendations & Action Plans

I. Expand Outreach

Outreach to child care centers

Children in school readiness and VPK programs in child care centers

How - Send letters to parents of all children in childcare/VPK, particularly in subsidized child care

Who - The Association of Early Learning Coalitions (AELC)


Time frame - Immediately

Simplify search for application assistance

How - Implement smart phone referral application—App available for smart phones that will connect potential or current enrollees with a community partners in their area

I. Expand Outreach (continued)


Expand coordination with school free and reduced lunch programs

3. Simplify Application Process

Use automation and data matching programs

Who - Social Service agencies and Children's Services Councils

How- One-E App is a Web-based system that lets families and individuals apply for multiple health, social service and other support programs from one location. One-e-App is used by consumers themselves or by staff who assist families and individuals at community clinics, hospitals, state and county agencies, food banks and other locations. The system allows individuals to apply for a range of programs such as Medicaid, CHIP, Food Stamps (SNAP), Earned Income Tax Credit, Child Tax Credit, utility assistance, local health insurance expansion programs and more

When - Ongoing



Recommendations & Action Plans

3. Simplify Application Process (continued)

Implement Presumptive eligibility

How - Statutory change to allow children to be "presumed" eligible temporarily so they can receive services while a full application is pending

When - Potentially 2013 Session/as the economy recovers

Improve electronic citizenship check

Who - FHKC, DCF

How - Obtain access for FHKC eligibility system to access Social Security data base

When - Future opportunity


4. Expand populations eligible for enrollment/subsidy




